Dear Parents/Caregivers

Mid-Year reports are now being prepared and these will be issued on Friday 29 June to senior and junior students. Progress Conference evenings will be held for students and their parents on 2 and 7 August in Term 3. The time lapse between issuing reports and having progress conferences is deliberate. It gives students the opportunity to work on the advice offered in the subject reports and so improve their academic performance before receiving more feedback at the conferences.

At this time of the year colds and flu are on the increase. Students can take some simple precautions to reduce the impact of these illnesses on themselves and fellow students by wearing appropriate winter school uniform, having adequate wet weather protection and washing and drying their hands properly. Those who are not well should remain at home so that they can recover more quickly and not spread their illness.

If any student is on medication or has health issues which are likely to impact on any aspect of their schooling, parents/caregivers should directly contact our school nurse and discuss the situation with her. Our school nurse, Mrs Glynne Newton is available on 627 0600 extension 755. In an emergency, our nurse is likely to be the first medic on the scene. Nurse Newton also needs to be notified by a parent when a student requires medication during the day. All medicine required by a student during the school day must be stored in her office. Your child's Dean should also be notified. If a student feels unwell after arriving at school, then he or she should go and see the Nurse in the first instance, who will contact parents or caregivers.

Spare uniform

Now that winter is here, we are in need of school jerseys and jackets to loan to students who for a number of reasons do not have them. If you have any of these items that are no longer required by your family we would appreciate having them. You can deliver them to the reception desk at any time during the school day.

Teachers' Paid Union Meeting

The New Zealand Post Primary Teachers' Association has informed us that there will be a paid union meeting on **Tuesday 12 June**. Students will be sent home at the end of Period 4 (12.40pm). However, supervised study will be available for students if they are waiting for a bus or to be collected by family. These students should report to the Hall at 1.00pm. The HCD school bus will depart from Boundary Road at 12.50pm.

Our Deans' reception desk is receiving an increasing number of lunches being brought in for students by parents/caregivers. We would appreciate your support in encouraging your sons/daughters to be responsible for ensuring that *they* bring their lunch to school as, with the very busy demands on the Deans' reception area, there is no guarantee students will receive these lunches before the end of the day.

Student Leader Profile – International Student Representative

Hello, Kia Ora, 哈囉, こんにちは, 안녕하세요. My name is Matthew Ng, your International Student Representative for 2012. It has been three years since I first came to New Zealand from Hong Kong. So many people have asked me why I came to New Zealand rather than the UK or USA. One of the reasons is that when I researched a possible destination it appeared that New Zealand had an excellent environment for study, as well as offering life experience that could not be found in Hong Kong. I think that my experience is applicable to every international student.

Our school has had international students for 18 years. There are over 100 international students from 15 different countries enrolled so far this year with most of them planning to graduate from Lynfield and continue with university studies in New Zealand or go back to their home country. Some of them come on an exchange programme, which allows them to stay in New Zealand for a short period of time.

Improving our English skills is the most common reason why international students enroll at New Zealand schools like Lynfield College. Some students have limited English skills so they avoid chatting in English and keep chatting in their first language. That is very sad because they will not improve their English skills as quickly even though there are lots of opportunities to speak in English. Speaking in English is promoted by the International Office, their parents and also me. So in my role, I have a



responsibility and opportunity to help International Students, as I know what the feeling is like to be studying overseas and staying away from parents and friends. Fortunately, we have got classmates, teachers and International staff, as well as host families who can make things much easier for us. Many international students are living with host families, which gives us lots of opportunities to speak in English, gain amazing life experiences in New Zealand and have someone to talk with when we need help. I have been staying with my host family since I first came to New Zealand and they have been very nice and kind. They always chat with me so I can improve my English and let me join their family gatherings, so it makes me feel I am part of their family.

Just two months ago, Lynfield held a Cultural Festival which was a great day and I was glad to see so many international students involved in different cultural groups. It was lovely to see Lisa, Maya, Yuka and Mayuko wearing their Japanese kimono, walking around the campus, taking pictures with others.

At the beginning of next term, about 30 new international students will join our school, and they will definitely need some help from us to adapt to this new environment. So, if any of them join your class, but are sitting at the back of the room full of fear, please go and say hi and introduce yourself! I am sure this will help them a lot, by giving them an opportunity to chat in English and adapt to our school much more quickly.

2012 Production – Romeo & Juliet

Lynfield College's modern telling of the classic tragic romance.

This year Lynfield College departs from its tradition of musical productions to bring you the classic but ever contemporary romance - Shakespeare's Romeo and Juliet. Lynfield's version promises a modern perspective on the famous play, using modern music, costumes and some outlandish make up. One ancient item remains - the swords. Our actors have been honing their sword skills through regular practice, and the sword fighting will provide much excitement and tension during the play. With plenty of violence, tension and romance, this is a show teenagers will lap up.

Unusually, this production will be 'in the round' – a central stage with the audience in scaffolded seating on four sides of the hall. Another modern aspect is the dancing at the Capulets' party, where energetic hiphop and Latin dance skills will be on display. The set, costumes and performances will create anew Shakespeare's story in the modern world, as lovers meet while their feuding families go to war and prove unable to stop their fighting, with bitter consequence.

Starring in "Romeo and Juliet" are experienced drama students. They include Dion Pritchard as Romeo, winner of Best Supporting Actor at the AMI awards last year, and Emily Jenkins as Juliet. Other cast members are Holly Stokes as the very comical nurse, Breanna Blackwell as Lady Capulet, Josh Edmonds as Lord Capulet, Tom Jaeger as Mercutio, Billy Scarfe as Benvolio, James Olsen as Tybalt, James Heskett as friar Laurence, Ben Fleming Yates as Balthasar and Gregory, Anup Menon as Sampson, Brayden Silby as Lord Montague, Samantha Holland as Lady Montague, and playing the prince as a Queen instead, is Zoe Vickery. As well, a large number of students are participating in the chorus, sword fighting and dancing.

The show opens on Tuesday 19 June with matinee performances for local intermediate schools. This year we are having a special matinee for Year 10 on Friday 22 June.

NZQA Fees and Financial Assistance

The 2012 NZQA fee for domestic students is \$76.70, with a maximum of \$200 per family. This includes up to three Scholarship subject entries. Extra Scholarship entries are \$76.70 per subject.

Invoices and instructions for payment were issued to students on Wednesday 2 May. **The deadline for payment is Friday 29 June** (last day of Term 2). The invoice **MUST** be returned when payment is made. <u>Cheques should be made</u> <u>out to Lynfield College</u>.

If any students who are entering NCEA have not yet received an invoice, they should see Mr Delgrosso urgently.

The cost for International fee paying students is \$383.30. This does not include Scholarship entries, which are \$102.20 per subject. Financial assistance cannot be claimed for International fee paying students.

Financial assistance is available for those who:

- > are receiving a Work and Income or Study Link benefit, or
- have a Community Services Card, or
- have a joint family income that would qualify for a Community Services Card, or

> have two or more children entered as candidates this year with fees totalling more than \$200.

(Where fees are payable for more than one candidate, a maximum of \$100 per child and \$200 per fee payer)

The fee for those qualifying for financial assistance in the first three categories is \$20, with a maximum of \$30 per family.

You must fill in an application form to receive financial assistance. <u>A new application has to be filled in each</u> <u>year</u> – if you received financial assistance last year it does not carry over.

Financial assistance application forms are now available from the Deans' Reception. The form should be completed and returned to school as soon as possible to ensure that students receive an invoice for the reduced amount when the billing run is done.

CONGRATULATIONS! Our students continue to have success in a wide variety of sports:

Baseball

After only one season playing this sport, Nick Weaver (Y11) has been selected as a member of the NZ U17 Baseball team to compete in the Asia Pacific Little League U17 Senior League Championships. This tournament will be played in Guam in July.

Golf

Five students took part in the Auckland Secondary Schools Strokeplay Golf Championships this week. Congratulations to Shantael (Y9) and Esmeralda Ligaliga (Y10), whose "nett scores" placed them 1st and 2nd respectively in this section of the tournament.

Bowls
