Student Leader Profile – Board of Trustees Student Representative

Kia Ora. My name is James Olsen, and I am the Student Representative on the Lynfield College Board of Trustees, and the Chair of the Lynfield College Student Council. As the Student Representative I have the same standing on the Board as any other member, however unlike other members I provide a student opinion and perspective on all decisions and issues. My appointment to Council Chair is to supplement my role on the Board, and make it much easier for student voice to reach the management and Board of the College.



Prior to attending the first meeting, I received professional training which assisted me to understand my role and responsibilities. Since then I have attended a 5 day governance course which gave a more in depth analysis of Board operations, procedures, policies and legislative compliance. So far I have been able to have a say in the development and construction of the new tuck shop which would be located where the weights room currently stands. On finalisation of funding this project will commence immediately.

The Student Council comprises representatives from every Year 9-13 form class, who meet twice a term or more frequently if required, to discuss major issues in the school. This experience along with leadership training days advance their leadership qualities. Any student may stand as the Council Representative for their form class and elections are held at the start of each year. The Student Council has met twice this year, looking specifically at the establishment of new school rules, with completion expected by the end of the year.

The ability to walk into meetings and think objectively and regard the long term repercussions of actions was a challenge at first but easily mastered with the support of fellow trustees. The role is unlike any other in the College being both a student and a trustee, however it is a rich experience which changes your thinking and perception. Next year I hope to build on experience gained in my role, by undertaking a joint degree in Commerce and Law.

New In Zone Streets

2012 Production – Romeo & Juliet

Lynfield College's modern telling of the classic tragic romance.


This year Lynfield College departs from its tradition of musical productions to bring you the classic but ever contemporary romance - Shakespeare's Romeo and Juliet. Lynfield's version promises a modern perspective on the famous play, using modern music, costumes and some outlandish make up. One ancient item remains - the swords. Our actors have been honing their sword skills through regular practice, and the sword fighting will provide much excitement and tension during the play. With plenty of violence, tension and romance, this is a show teenagers will lap up.

Unusually, this production will be 'in the round' – a central stage with the audience in scaffolded seating on four sides of the hall. Another modern aspect is the dancing at the Capulets' party, where energetic hiphop and Latin dance skills will be on display. The set, costumes and performances will create anew Shakespeare's story in the modern world, as lovers meet while their feuding families go to war and prove unable to stop their fighting, with bitter consequence.

Starring in "Romeo and Juliet" are experienced drama students. They include Dion Pritchard as Romeo, winner of Best Supporting Actor at the AMI awards last year, and Emily Jenkins as Juliet. Other cast members are Holly Stokes as the very comical nurse, Breanna Blackwell as Lady Capulet, Josh Edmonds as Lord Capulet, Tom Jaeger as Mercutio, Billy Scarfe as Benvolio, James Olsen as Tybalt, James Heskett as friar Laurence, Ben Fleming Yates as Balthasar and Gregory, Anup Menon as Sampson, Brayden Silby as Lord Montague, Samantha Holland as Lady Montague, and playing the prince as a Queen instead, is Zoe Vickery. As well, a large number of students are participating in the chorus, sword fighting and dancing.

Dress warmly, bring a cushion and let the ancient Bard and Lynfield students give you a moving and powerful experience.

Tickets are now on sale and students are able to purchase tickets from a sales desk during lunchtimes. Members of the public may also purchase tickets from Reception.

Many of you will remember Katie Bowen who was Y13 in 2011. She has had an amazing start to her international football career playing in the FIFA Women's World Cup. She is now signing to attend the University of North Carolina, the most successful women's football university in the US. We wish her well in her new venture.

Our current students continue to have outstanding success in a wide variety of sports:

Cora Munt has retained her ranking of 3rd Junior in the world for Active Pistol Shooting after competing in the Bianchi Cup in Missouri, USA recently. She also placed 1st Junior and 1st Woman in two other competitions, both in Michigan.

Tracey Coffin competed in the 2012 New Zealand United Tae-Kwon-Do Federation Open Championships in Tauranga during Queen's Birthday weekend. She finished 2nd in her division, gaining a silver medal.

All 8 of our senior netball teams play each week on a Tuesday evening at Te Pai Courts in Henderson. This fixture is never cancelled regardless of the weather so the girls have played in some unpleasant and challenging conditions over the last seven weeks! All senior teams are nearing the end of the first round of competition and the next two games will determine their championship grade. The Senior Green team has remained largely unchanged from last season and is a social team with several girls who had never played netball before. In terms of wins, they have not been successful but all players enjoy the challenge and their team spirit cannot be faulted. Last week they were finally rewarded for all their hard work and training when they had a really well deserved win over St Dominic's. This week they were on target for a second win until their GS partially tore her Achilles tendon towards the end of the second quarter and the team had to play the rest of the game with only six players!

We are trying to meet the sporting needs of as many students as possible. Recently we have had some interest expressed in forming a junior (Y9 and Y10) cycling team but need more cyclists. Please contact the Sports Office (ext 595) if your child has an interest in this field.

Below is a rare opportunity for female dancers and athletes to receive nutrition advice and bone density scans which will empower them to make better nutrition choices for their performance and their future health. This is a Massey University study, based at the Albany campus.

"We have a team of nutrition experts at Massey University who need your help. They are conducting a study on the effects of vitamin D on muscle strength and bone health in female dancers/indoor athletes (including gymnastics & gym sports, aerobics, trampolining and cheerleading) aged between 13-18 who train indoors at least an hour a day, five days a week. Participants who sign up will need to come to the Massey University Albany campus three times over a 6-12 month period. They'll need to take a vitamin D supplement or placebo (they won't know which one they're getting) and answer some simple questions about training and health. In return, the participants will be tested and measured in: muscle strength and power, bone mineral density, body composition, vitamin D levels, iron levels. They will also get nutrition advice that could improve their performance in their chosen art or sport, and a snapshot of their bone health so they're aware of what their skeletal structure is currently like. These teenage years are essential in laying down the foundation of bone density so that in years to come, they don't end up with brittle bones.

Approximately 100 participants are needed by the July school holidays. The lead researcher, Sarah Mitchell (ph 021 160 5949) and her supervisor Dr Pamela von Hurst (ph 09 414 0800 ext 41205) would be happy to answer any questions that parents or potential participants have."
