On Wednesday 28 June, a selected group of Lynfield College extra-curricular Robotics students were invited to showcase digital technology in a practical, hands-on format to the 200 attendees, comprising education leaders, senior MOE officials, primary and secondary school principals and leaders in digital technology.

The College was superbly represented by these 7 students who were the first speakers to address the forum, where they gave a student voice on how technology is enriching their education and how, through their involvement in the school's VEX Robotics programme, they are being supported to be digital leaders. The aim of the forum was for people to leave with greater knowledge of digital technology and the innovation happening within education. The students were able to do this through telling their unique Lynfield College Robotics story.

This was followed by a practical, hands-on session in the forum's 'Tech Space' where three Lynfield students setup and facilitated demonstrations. With six operational robots on display, many of the attendees took the opportunity to drive a robot.

National Chamber Music Composition Winner

Congratulations to Stefenie Pickston (Y12) who is the Auckland winner of the National Chamber Music Composition contest (junior section) for her string quartet Bolero: A Short Piece for String Quartet. Composition adjudicator Michael Norris said Stefenie Pickston's composition was a "really interesting take on the bolero dance" and he commended her references to Ravel's Bolero, "the suave little chromaticisms, the playfulness of the rhythms and the gradual building of textural density".

Stefenie is justifiably very pleased and proud with her win. She originally was asked to write a piece for a school ensemble to perform in the contest, but the ensemble didn't eventuate so Stefenie entered it into the composition section herself. It was the first time she had entered the composition section of the contest, but has been composing music for some years. Stefenie mostly plays clarinet, but also violin and was inspired by hearing a piece at the KBB Music Festival which had string players using a range of different techniques to create music and rhythm including using their hands to "swipe" across their instruments. She is interested in the idea that a bow can be used in lots of different ways to create music.

The restaurant visit served a double purpose. On their return to school the students commenced their written review in Japanese of their day out. The written text will be sent to Japan to their email buddies, while also serving as one of their two texts required for their internal assessment writing portfolio.



Lynfield College students talk about their 40 Hour Famine experience

Lynfield College students made a variety of sacrifices for the 40 Hour Famine, including food (eating just rice), technology, or even walking/running 40 km in 40 hours! Each student recognised the importance of their efforts in the lives of Syrian children and it was definitely a challenging experience, but one that they will remember for a long time! Here are the accounts of some students' 40 Hour Famine journeys:

Nicole Johnson: For the Famine, I walked/ran 40 km over 40 hours and I had a variety of events which helped me reach my 40 km goal e.g. walking home from my friend's house and a hockey game. I tried to get most of the walking/running done early in the day and my Dad and friend Otoha, joined me for the remaining kilometres. Overall it was challenging and time-consuming, yet a fun experience (up until Sunday morning when my legs were not happy campers anymore). Unity is so powerful and important, so the fact that many Syrian refugees have had to flee their homes and often lose friends and family members means it must be incredibly hard for them to keep going. For me, I learnt that walking 40 km in 40 hours isn't great fun, but the people around you make all the difference. I hope that through the money raised, Syrian refugees are able to feel supported, like I did during the 40 Hour Famine. I hope that those who have lost loved ones will be able to find new friends and new families to call their own and I hope that this money will help them to feel united with us overseas and with other refugees like them, because although we are different, we are all human.

Kais Azimullah: Doing the 40 Hour Famine was a unique experience, as I decided to go without something we're all guilty of using our phones. In terms of the duration of the Famine, it became progressively harder, as I'd want to use my phone more and more. However, I was able to keep my focus in check. Overall, it showed me how reliant I am on my phone and I realised how privileged I am compared to the Syrian children I was raising money for.

Hannah Woolford: I gave up television, which really opened my eyes and made me realise how much time I actually spend watching TV. It was a difficult 40 hours, but was totally worth it because the feeling of helping others is amazing! Knowing it was a good cause helped me push through until the end.

Maya Micklefield: I gave up food for the 40 Hour Famine, to be able to increase my understanding of the suffering the Syrian children and refugees have to go through. By Sunday morning, I was starting to feel quite dizzy and sick, but it was an experience I will never, ever forget! Participating in the 40 Hour Famine this year is by far one of my proudest achievements, as I managed to raise \$850 for World Vision's Child Friendly Spaces, which will be enough to provide 45 children with stationary packs or 18 children with nutritious morning teas for a whole Term. I'm overwhelmed by how much support I received and I hope that the money raised will help to put a smile on a Syrian child's face and allow them to simply play and learn as children again, despite all the traumatic events they have gone through.

Quilting for a Cause

Working in groups of 4-6 students, the Year 9 Soft Materials classes have been focusing on quilt-making. After first choosing a target audience and developing a theme, the students have produced beautiful appliqued quilts. The completed work will be donated to Foster Hope and given to children in care.
