### Dear Parents/Caregivers

This is an extremely busy time of the year, as you can see from the page 1 calendar.

We have a period of senior assessment in week 7, from Tuesday 2 to Friday 5 June. The draft timetable is on the student e-LynC site and will also be on the College website, which parents can access. Any assessment clashes must be reported to Mr Waddington, Academic Advisor, as a matter of urgency and an alternative time during the week arranged.

If a student misses an exam because of illness or an emergency, the College must be contacted on the day of assessment, using the absence phone line (627 0600 option 1/extension 729), leaving a message for the student's Dean. If the missed assessment is an internal for NCEA, a doctor's certificate should also be given to Mr Waddington and arrangements made to sit the assessment before the end of the exam week.

Students in Years 9 and 10 have normal class timetables during the assessment days, although there will be some room changes advertised in the daily notices each day (these are also on e-LynC and the school noticeboards). If you have any questions about assessment activities please contact Mr Waddington through the school office.

# NZQA Fees and Financial Assistance

The 2015 NZQA fee for domestic students is \$76.70, with a maximum of \$200 per family.

**NB:** Previously, three Scholarship entries were included in this \$76.70 NCEA fee. This is no longer the case. NZQA now charges a \$30 per subject fee for Scholarship entries. Payment of the standard fee should be made as soon as possible. Invoices for the extra amount for Scholarship candidates will be issued later when Scholarship entries have been finalised.

The cost for International fee paying students is \$383.30. This does not include Scholarship entries, which are \$102.20 per subject. Financial assistance cannot be claimed for International fee paying students.

Financial assistance is available for those who meet one of the following criteria:

- currently receiving a Work and Income or Study Link benefit, or have a current Community Services Card (benefit-based applications)
- are not currently receiving a benefit, or do not have a current Community Services Card, but do have a joint family income that would entitle you to receive a Community Services Card (income-based applications)
- have two or more children who are candidates, irrespective of family income, and the total fees you would have to pay would otherwise be more than the \$200 multiple candidate maximum (multiple candidate applications).

The fee for those qualifying for financial assistance in the first three categories is \$20, with a maximum of \$30 per family.

You must fill in an application form to receive financial assistance.

<u>A new application has to be filled in each year</u> – if you received financial assistance last year it does not automatically carry over.

**Financial assistance application forms are now available from the Deans' Reception.** The form should be completed and returned to Mr Delgrosso's office as soon as possible. Students with a full fee invoice (\$76.70) should return it when they bring in their completed Financial Assistance form. A new invoice for the adjusted amount will be issued. The process can be shortened if the student brings in the \$20 fee when they return the completed Financial Assistance form.

Invoices have been issued to students, with payment due by the end of this term (3 July). Please plan for this payment so that you can help us to meet our NZQA deadlines. For most students, the fee will be \$76.70.



# **Students Travelling Overseas**

At any time during the year there are 10-12 students travelling with family overseas. This is more common in the junior school and tends to peak either side of the school holidays. These trips are for many reasons; family reunions, ill relatives, sporting or cultural opportunities, opportunities for the parents to travel and take children with them. In many cases these are once in a life time opportunities for the family and student.

The school however needs to be informed and it is recorded on the student's attendance record that an overseas trip has taken place. This information is shared with the Dean, attendance officer and form teacher. The Ministry of Education generally categorises these as explained but not justified absences.

Prior to departure the student should remind the Dean of their absence and let teachers know. While teachers will let students know the topics that will be missed it is unrealistic for teachers to set individual work for students to do while away. Students can keep up to date with their work by keeping in contact electronically with friends in the class and get material sent to them. Some class work may also be available through the e–LynC portal, especially in the senior school. An assessment calendar is available for all students on the front page of e-LynC and is useful when planning absences.

If an internal assessment takes place during the absence it is unlikely that it can be retaken. The student should discuss this with the teacher concerned. A written assignment may be able to be handed in before departure however a field trip or practical cannot be taken later.

### Theft of bikes from schools

The Police report there is a sharp increase in the theft of bicycles at the moment in Auckland. Schools are often seen as a soft target by the thieves who are typically stealing high-end mountain or road bikes. However, any bike that presents an opportunity is at risk.

High schools and intermediate schools are the preferred targets due to the bikes matching the size of the offenders and students need to take precautions to help prevent this offending.

Steps that can be taken to minimise the risk are:

- Every student who brings a bike to school should have it locked with an appropriate bike lock at school. This lock needs to be connected from the bike to the bike rack or other parking structure.
- Students should record their bike's serial number this is normally located on the underside of the frame where the pedals
  connect.

Our students certainly take on some interesting sports and challenges!



Last month Michael raced in the NZ Road Race Championships where he placed 5<sup>th</sup> in the U19 race which was raced over 105km. Michael was then selected to ride in the Cycling NZ U19 Academy Team in the NZ Elites Road Series. There are 12 teams of 8 in the senior elite section. This was round 3 of the series based out of Hokitika and the race was 140km long. Weather conditions were very cold and wet. He made it into the lead bunch of 23 riders in the last lap and finished 15<sup>th</sup> in the sprint for the line. Michael's Cycling NZ Academy team finished in first place in the team competition, having 3 riders in the first 15 places. Next round is in Ashburton on 15 August.
