#### Dear parents / Caregivers

Thank you to all parents/Caregivers who attended the progress conferences in weeks 4 and 5. Over 3,000 interviews took place, ensuring valuable feedback on students' progress was gained by parents and teaching staff. We had a lot of very positive feedback on the change of venue and as a consequence this will continue in 2018.

We have a very wide range of extra-curricular activities at Lynfield and many of our students take full advantage of the opportunities to get involved, whether it be an interest in sport, arts, culture, community-based activities or a combination of these. This term has been particularly rich in school events and I would like to thank all students and staff who have contributed to the vibrant and caring community of Lynfield College. Here are a few examples of what has been happening recently.

- Our Student Executive-organised Cancer Awareness Week included a Shave for a Cure event on Wednesday 23 August and Daffodil Day on Thursday 24 August. Three staff members and two students, Head Boy Dylan Kay and Deputy Head Rupin Kumar braved the winter temperatures to have their heads shaved for a good cause. It was a fantastic effort by all who participated and together with funds raised from Talent Quest, students and staff raised a whopping \$3,616 for cancer research.
- On the evening of our mid-term break, Monday 28 August, I had the pleasure of accompanying five students to the World Vision Awards Evening, where those invited were publicly acknowledged for their contribution to the 40 Hour Famine effort. Maya Micklefield, Eve Gabor, Nene Matsuki, Nicole Johnson and Zahraa Zamin have had prominent roles in organising the 40 Hour Famine effort at Lynfield and have already begun planning for 2018.
- The Music Department's Jazz and Soul Concert on Tuesday 29 August was an inspiring evening where College bands performed to a capacity audience. With the Big Band having recently been awarded a Gold at the KBB Music Festival for the 8<sup>th</sup> consecutive year and named BEST BIG BAND, and the Concert Band awarded a Silver, these very polished performers showed us how well deserved these awards are. We were especially lucky to have guest band UNION with lead vocalist Leza Corban also performing.
- Our debating teams are experiencing another very successful year and we wish them well in their grand finals over the next two weeks. I would like to make special mention of the Premier Advanced debaters Jia Dua, Karan Kalsi and Kitty Sun, who as Year 13 students will be leaving at the end of this year. They have made an enormous contribution to debating at Lynfield College. We look forward to team member Harry Ashley (Year 12) continuing in debating next year. A comprehensive update of all the teams is included in this newsletter.
- The commitment of our sports teams through a very wet winter, both in trainings and in competition, has brought some outstanding results. You can read about these successes in the sports section of this newsletter. Next week we have 5 teams competing in the NZ Secondary Schools Winter Tournament at various locations in the North Island. We wish them the very best of luck
- On Thursday 31 August, I travelled with 12 of our Robotics students to experience a once in a lifetime opportunity. They travelled to Waitangi to meet Sophia the world's most advanced humanoid robot. Lynfield College had the honour of being the only school in New Zealand invited to the Morgo Conference of Australasian high-powered entrepreneurs and business leaders.

The students were able to spend half an hour with Dr Ben Goertzl, the Chief Scientist of Hanson Robotics and Chairman of the Artificial General Intelligence Society. He spoke with the group about the development of Sophia and the role that Fine Arts, Mechanics, Algebra and Programming all play in developing an artificially intelligent humanoid robot.

Irisha Inamke and Michael Howell then introduced Dr Goertzl and Sophia to the Morgo Conference for their keynote speech at this event. In this presentation we heard about the development of artificial general intelligence, the future of humanity and the wide perspectives on where this could all head. This was from the perspective of Dr Goertzl along with input and interaction from Sophia.

After the keynote, we were able to get up close to Sophia, interact with her and see what all the components were made of. It was a fascinating experience and definitely opened the eyes of our students to what the future of robotics could be.

The news story about Sophia, including interaction with some of our students, will be on the 6pm News tonight on TV3.



The first of our major prizegivings for the year, the Festival Awards Evening, will be held on Thursday 19 October in Term 4 and further details are contained in this newsletter. I welcome the families of students who are receiving awards to join us in celebrating the 2017 sporting, arts and cultural achievements of our very talented and committed senior students.

## **Debating Success**

#### Impromptu Cup

Congratulations to Karan Kalsi and Jia Dua (Year 13) for WINNING the Impromptu Cup on Sunday 20 August at Auckland University. They beat Diocesan College easily in a 4-1 split decision. They successfully negated the moot "This house believes that parents should not raise their children with a particular religion" with only five minutes to prepare their case, hence the impromptu limited preparation format which really challenges debaters. Karan received Best Speaker at the twoday tournament.

Six Lynfield Senior debaters performed impressively at the Impromptu Cup in the preliminary rounds at St Cuthbert's on Saturday 19 August. For the first time ever, Lynfield had two teams break into the final rounds and we were the only school in Auckland to do it! As well as Karan and Jia, Kyus Rodger (Year 11) and Harry Ashley (Year 12) also made the break to the Quarterfinals, placing 8th equal in the tournament.

#### Junior Open

Well done to the Junior Open team members: Roshni Bhatti, Isha Ramanlal, Tanvi Kher, along with reserves Aashish Ramanlal and Vibhuti Patel who performed extremely well in their semi-final against Rangitoto held 21 August at Lynfield. In a 2-1 split decision, they lost the debate but still made us VERY proud with the very high level of debating skills. Congratulations for being the first Year 9 Lynfield team to ever reach the Semi-final of the Junior Open!



#### **Junior Premier**

The Junior Premier Lynfield 1 team won their semi-final against Maclean's College. They successfully affirmed the moot "This house, as a minority actor, would refuse to play roles which are type cast to play into racial stereotype." # NZ's Next Top Engineering Scientist 2017

The 2017 competition was held on Saturday 5 August. The question was posted online at 9.00am and students had to compile a comprehensive report and email it to the organisers by the 6.00pm deadline. Now in its ninth year, this annual competition is a problem solving event for teams of three to four secondary students, organised by the Department of Engineering Science at University of Auckland.

2017 question: How many rocket launches from Mahia Peninsula would it take to establish a lunar colony?

This year we had 7 teams in total from Year 11, 12 and 13 students. The judges (PhD students and lecturers) at the university are now going through hundreds of reports and the results of the competition will be released early next term.



## **AHTA History Quiz**

On Thursday night a group of Year 11 and 12 students competed in the AHTA History Quiz. There were just over 50 teams competing. While the quiz was won by a team from St Peters College, 2<sup>nd</sup> place went to the team of Shreya Singaraju, Nicole D'Souza and Jacob Barry while 3<sup>rd</sup> place went to the team of Harry Ashley, Jack Kearns and Shamir Sharif. This was an awesome effort from the students. They are very excited about Lynfield being the most successful school on the night with two teams in the top three.

All senior students (Year 11-13) will have exams and or workshops to attend during this assessment time. These will include internal assessments, opportunities to complete portfolio-based work or practice for the external NCEA exams.

It is important that all senior students attend these workshops/exams – should, for any reason, a student be unable to attend the end of year NCEA External Examinations their grade from the practice external exams could potentially be used as a derived grade.

The morning assessment time slot starts at 8.30am and the afternoon time slot starts at 1.00pm. When students do not have an assessment or workshop they are encouraged to not be on school site. There is a study room available (B3) if needed.


# 4<sup>th</sup> Grade Rugby
