Dear Parents and Caregivers

The theme for assemblies this week has been Bullying-free Week with Lynfield College ending the week with today's 'Pink Shirt Day' celebrations.



I have asked our students to think about what THEY can do to make a difference.

A [survey](#) conducted in the US Canada indicated that 54% of the students who see bullying happen watch it and do nothing. My challenge for our students is 'Don't just be a bystander'. The same research found that in 57% of the time bullying will stop in under 10 seconds when someone intervenes.

The question I finished with was 'Who have you made feel about themselves today?' and for them to aim to be able to name at least six people every day.

Senior Assessment Week

We have a period of senior assessment starting next week, from **Monday 29 May to Friday 2 June**. The assessment timetable is on the student e-LynC which parents can access and there are links below. Any assessment clashes should have been reported to Mr Waddington, Academic Advisor, and an alternative time during the week arranged.

If a student misses an exam because of illness or an emergency, the College must be contacted on the day of assessment, using the absence phone line (627 0600 option 1/extension 729), leaving a message for the student's Dean. If the missed assessment is an internal for NCEA, a doctor's certificate should also be given to Mr Waddington and arrangements made to sit the assessment before the end of the exam week.

Students in Years 9 and 10 have normal class timetables during the assessment days, although there will be some room changes advertised in the daily notices each day (these are also on e-LynC and the school noticeboards). If you have any questions about assessment activities, please contact Mr Waddington through the school office.

At this time of the year colds and flu are on the increase. Students can take some simple precautions to reduce the impact of these illnesses on themselves and fellow students by wearing appropriate winter school uniform, having adequate wet weather protection and washing and drying their hands properly. Those who are not well should remain at home so that they can recover more quickly and not spread their illness.

If a student is on medication or has health issues which are likely to impact on any aspect of their schooling, parents/caregivers should directly contact our school nurse and discuss the situation with her. Our school nurse, Mrs Lee Hieatt is available on 627 0600 extension 755. In an emergency, our nurse is likely to be the first medic on the scene. Nurse Hieatt also needs to be notified by a parent when a student requires medication during the day. All medicine required by a student during the school day must be stored in her office. Your child's Dean should also be notified. If a student feels unwell after arriving at school, then he or she should go and see the Nurse in the first instance, who will contact parents or caregivers.

Process for **STUDENTS LEAVING SCHOOL** during the school day:

Families are encouraged to make appointments for students outside of normal school hours. However, should a student need to leave school early, they are to provide a signed note from home. This should indicate the reason and time of departure and then be signed by a Dean.

When the student is leaving, this note must be given to the Deans' Secretary and an exit slip will be completed.

Only if it is an emergency will a student be called from class without the above process being followed.

Off to the XLAB Science Camp in Gottingen, Germany in August!

Congratulations to Kitty Sun, Assistant Academic Captain, who is one of only two New Zealand students to be selected by Royal Society Te Apārangi to attend the prestigious XLAB Science Camp in Gottingen, Germany.

This particular opportunity is especially for senior secondary school and undergraduate students who are achieving excellence in their science studies and want to continue studying science at a higher level.

The number of participants is limited to just under 50 from around the world and is a great opportunity for talented young New Zealanders to interact with experts at the top of their fields in science. They will participate in four weeks of intense science where they will work in a small group supervised by scientists at the University of Gottingen and affiliated research organisations.

The students have the opportunity to select their preference of courses (choosing from analytical chemistry, anatomy, developmental biology, freshwater ecology, molecular biology, immunology, laser physics, neurophysiology and astrophysics) with hands-on experiments using highly specialised research instruments.

Whau Youth Award

Last night one of our Year 13 students, Shahin Najak, was presented with a Whau Youth Award. Shahin was nominated and selected by the community to be honoured for being an inspirational young person who is achieving greatness. In addition to Shahin being presented with this award she has been allocated a mentor from the Compost Collective to support her in the work she is doing to create a sustainable future.

Please note:

The Lynfield College School Ball is an extra, provided by the College to those students who meet the criteria to attend. Attendance at the Ball is a privilege and not a right. Students have been informed of the criteria since the start of the year.

NZQA Fees and Financial Assistance

Domestic student fee: \$76.70, with a maximum of \$200 per family.

Scholarship fee: an additional \$30 per subject.

Online payment via the Parent portal is available. Invoices for the extra amount for Scholarship candidates will be issued later when Scholarship entries have been finalised.

International student fee: \$383.30. Scholarship entries are \$102.20 per subject. Financial assistance cannot be claimed for International fee paying students.

Financial assistance is available for those who meet one of the following criteria:

- currently receiving a Work and Income or Study Link benefit, or have a current Community Services Card (benefit-based applications)
- are not currently receiving a benefit, or do not have a current Community Services Card, but do have a joint family income that would entitle you to receive a Community Services Card (income-based applications)
- have two or more children who are candidates, irrespective of family income, and the total fees you would have to pay would otherwise be more than the \$200 multiple candidate maximum (multiple candidate applications).

The fee for those qualifying for financial assistance in the first three categories is \$20, with a maximum of \$30 per family.

You must fill in an application form to receive financial assistance.

A new application has to be filled in each year – if you received financial assistance last year it does not automatically carry over.

Financial assistance application forms are now available from the Deans' Reception. The form should be completed and returned to Mr Delgrosso's office as soon as possible. The fee charged will be adjusted as soon as the application is processed. The process can be shortened if the student brings in the \$20 fee when they return the completed Financial Assistance form.

Invoices have been issued to students. We would like the payment to be made by the end of Term 2 (7 July). Please plan for this payment so that you can help us to meet our NZQA deadlines. For most students, the fee will be \$76.70.

There is an extra fee for entry in Scholarship subjects - \$30 per subject. Scholarship entries will not be done until later in the year when there is more data on student performance. A supplementary invoice will be issued at that stage.

NB: If payment is made at the Accounts Office, rather than online, the printed invoice should be handed in at the Accounts Office at the time of payment.



Our next house competition is Volleyball which begins 20 June with all houses playing every lunchtime for 2 weeks.

Run Club

This new initiative is **NOT** only for those who are keen runners. It was started at the request of students. On a Tuesday, Wednesday or Thursday those who want to **run, jog or walk** for fitness meet at the staffroom at 7.30am. The course varies between 3.3km and 5km. North/West zone Cross Country

This was held recently at Moire Park, Massey and we were 1 of only 2 West Auckland schools to compete in this meet. Danielle Hewett finished 20th in a field of 57 in the Junior Girls event. The other 8 Lynfield competitors finished about the middle of their respective age groups and really enjoyed the experience.

Team Talk

A total of 59 teams are entered in weekly winter competitions this year. The number in each code is: Badminton 9, Netball (senior) 7, Basketball (boys) 5, Netball (junior) 7, Basketball (girls) 1, Rugby League 1, Football (boys) 7, Rugby 2, Football (girls) 2, Squash 2, Hockey (boys) 3, Table Tennis 5, Hockey (girls) 2, Curling 6

Huge thanks to those parents who have put their hands up to help with managing or coaching our teams. It is very much appreciated by the many students who would not otherwise have been in school teams.

All winter codes have had impressive results:

1st XI Boys Football team have played 3 games in the A2 grade after winning promotion as a result of their 1st place in A3 last year. Many of our 2016 team were Y13 so the A2 grade is an excellent challenge for our relatively young team however all matches have been close, hard fought games bringing close losses. They are gelling really quickly under the coaching of Kim Beale, and are attacking every ball with absolute determination.

1st XI Girls Hockey team won their 1st game by default but showed their strength last Friday when they had a 7-0 win over Marist 2nd XI. Most of this team are new to 1st XI and are really making good progress under the guidance of their coach, Peter Oakley.

Netball teams have now entered their 1st competition round and are performing very well. There have been a mixture of wins and losses with some very, very hard fought games. The **Premier 1** team had 2 good wins this week beating Massey Prem 1 by 2 goals and Green Bay High by 6.
