#### Year 13 Geography Muriwai Beach Field Trip

Most visitors to Muriwai take sunscreen and a towel. However, for Lynfield College Year 13 Geographers, the items of choice were aluminium foil, vaseline, oranges and wooden metre rulers. Collecting data for their research internal assessment, they used these items to conduct a range of experiments at Muriwai Beach and neighbouring Māori Bay. Comparisons were made of the speed and direction of sea currents, the slope of the beaches and the movement of sand by the wind. This valuable outdoor experience enabled the students to see first-hand legendary features they had heard of in class – stacks, pillow-lava, platforms, an arch and a blow-hole.

#### **Olympians and Refugees Day**

On Tuesday 19 June the New Zealand Olympic Committee organised a New Zealand Olympians day at the Trusts Arenas in Henderson to celebrate World Refugee Day. This provided some of our refugee students with a wonderful opportunity to try different Olympic sports and to engage with Olympians like Barbara Kendall, Emily Gaddum, Evelyn Williamson, Tim Slyfield, Lindsay Tait, Chantal Brunner and Alexis Pritchard. They also appreciated how sport can unite cultures, by providing young people with opportunities to learn new skills, challenge themselves and interact in a fun atmosphere.

Three hundred refugee students from intermediate and secondary schools took part. They enjoyed sports with which they were familiar: football, basketball, volleyball and badminton. But, they also had a go at some very different activities. Seniors learned to fence, many students got to throw a bronze medal winner on to the judo mat and learned how to defend themselves with basic karate. Most had never swung a golf club, but tried their hand on the improvised range and some students learned cheerleading moves. Lynfield College students participated with enthusiasm and in great sporting spirit. Our students were accompanied by Refugee Coordinator Chris Bangs, ESOL teacher Frances Maihi and bilingual assistant Hosai Abrahimi.

#### Asia New Zealand Foundation - Japan Sports Forum

In May, I was lucky enough to be selected along with 9 other Physical Education teachers from around New Zealand to attend the Japan Sports Forum. This was organised and funded by the Asia-New Zealand foundation, which endeavours to connect New Zealanders with Asia.

The forum was an opportunity for us to immerse ourselves in Japanese culture with a focus on sport and PE and to bring our experiences and connections back to share with our students, peers and community.

The week-long forum was based in Tokyo and included a wide variety of experiences. We visited numerous schools and universities, attended various sporting events including J-league Baseball, the Grand Sumo and a Judo Kodokan. We observed traditional Japanese sports in action including Kendo and toured the Olympic and Rugby World Cup sites to get a gauge on progress. We had guest speakers including the New Zealand ambassador to Japan, expat teachers, rugby coaches and players who gave us insights into life and work in Japan. It was a full and busy week with learning experiences around every corner.

One of the key messages I took away from the forum was that Japan offers many opportunities for our young people and is an interesting, vibrant and hospitable country. While being very different from New Zealand, there are also similarities. Japanese love sport as much as we do but just enjoy it in a slightly different but intriguing way. They are generous and welcoming and New Zealanders are widely respected, especially for our sporting prowess. The opportunities to work or study and play sport in Japan are more accessible than many realise. As the host country for the Rugby World Cup in 2019 and the Summer Olympics in 2020, Japan is an exciting destination to consider.

My intention now is to use the connections that I have made in Japan and through the Asia-New Zealand Foundation to facilitate opportunities for Lynfield College students to experience Japan whether it be in a sporting context, education or simply as a travel experience.

I would like to thank the Asia–New Zealand Foundation for funding my attendance at this forum and Lynfield College for allowing me the opportunity to broaden my cultural horizons. It is certainly an experience I will never forget.

#### Match Report: Lynfield College Vs Onehunga High School - Saturday 26 May

After a narrow loss last Saturday, the boys were excited to get into game 2 of the 2018 season against Onehunga High School at Ferguson Park. Most turned up really early to both LC and Ferguson Park, and excitement was building throughout the team with the naming of the side. The lucky 22 players got named by the coaches with a few last-minute changes due to players falling sick, or not arriving on time.

Our mind-set was not like the previous week, switched on from the time we left the changing rooms, but with all the team now down on the field doing their personal warm ups, we got into the swing of our warm up. And the last minute disruptions did not stop there, with our game being moved to Ferguson Park No 2 not the No 1 as per the draw. But never mind, we took that as good challenge.

Kick off time arrived with the whistle from our referee. Nick took control of the team, with a couple of final words to motivate the boys. The early stage of the game went from end to end with neither team putting any points on the board. But around the 15min mark LC was hot on attack, with a lineout 5m from the OHS try line. OHS overthrew at the lineout, and Josh Kennedy pounced on the loose ball to race 5m to score in the left-hand corner. TJ stepped up and converted from close to the side-line for 7/0 lead.

From the restart, LC started to put the ball in the corners with strong wind behind them. And more points followed moments later with Lawrence Vui, finishing off a nice backline movement again in the left-hand corner. Again, TJ stepped up and nailed the conversion from the side-line for 14/0 lead. From this point in the first half OHS took control of the game and scored 3 nice tries to lead into halftime 17/14.

Halftime came at the right time for LC, and the boys knew in the huddle that we now had tough task at hand - playing into the strong breeze, and being down on the scoreboard. But the coaches and leadership team had a lot of positive messages about what we needed to do better, and how we could get back into the game. The boys rolled up their sleeves and when to work in the 2<sup>nd</sup> half. Keeping the ball in hand and putting a lot more phases together. This put OHS under pressure, and infringing came, giving us the field position we needed to score. More points which came in the nice movement between back & forward and ended with David Stein scoring in the right-hand corner. LC back to 19/17 lead with about 20mins to play.

OHS went straight back on attack from the kick off, and put a lot of pressure on LC down in the 22m area. The LC boys keep on making tackle after tackle over the next 5mins without conceding any further points. But, after nice movement from OHS own half, they were able to cross for try out in the left-hand corner. OHS 22/19 with about 10mins to play. The boys rallied over the 10mins and started to put a lot more pressure back on OHS, who started again to infringe and conceded some more penalties to give a chance of either draw or win.
