2019 NZQA Fees

Information for Whānau and Guardians

It is important that we encourage students into a lifetime habit of donating blood and making a worthwhile contribution to their community. The Care of Children Act 2004 allows people 16 years and over to make their own decisions about whether or not they wish to give blood. Students may choose to donate blood at this session.

NZBS recommends students discuss becoming a blood donor with their family. If families have a particular objection to the student choosing to donate blood, please make this known to the student and to the school before the collection date stated above. More information about blood donation will be available on the day of collection.

Becoming a Blood Donor...

Age: First Time Donors: 16 to 65 years of age Existing Donors: Up to 71 years of age

Weight: Weigh at least 50 kg

Health:

- You must be in good health.
- You cannot donate if you have a cold, flu, sore throat, cold sore, stomach bug or any other infection.
- If you have recently had a tattoo or body piercing you cannot donate for 6 months from the date of the procedure.
- If you have visited the dentist for a minor procedure you must wait 24 hours before donating; for major work wait a month.

Travel: You must not have lived in the United Kingdom, France or the Republic of Ireland between 1980 and 1996 for more than 6 months or received a blood transfusion in ANY of these countries since 1980.

Food: You must have eaten some food during the four hours prior to donation.

Identification: You must bring suitable identification with you. Acceptable ID is a document or combination of documents containing three (3) separate identifiers (e.g. NZBS Donor ID number, Full name, Photograph, Date of Birth, Home Address). A Student ID Card is acceptable if it features a photograph and two of the identifiers listed above. With your consent we may also ask the school to confirm you are at least 16 years of age.

Getting Physical!

Term 2 has kicked off with a hiss and a roar, with a number of programmes running each week here at Lynfield College.

- Our **Taekwondo** instructor continues to come one lunchtime each week, and this term has both female and male students training with him each week they are improving rapidly.
- **Fitness training** sessions are still running each Wednesday morning starting at 7.30am. This continues to be attended by a large group of students, who range from out top athletes to students who make this short, sharp fitness session their only sporting involvement. It is cleverly designed to challenge everyone at their own level. The atmosphere is very supportive with

students of all year levels are working together - many are commenting that they are seeing dramatic improvements in their fitness levels.

- This term sees the introduction of a weekly Pilates session. A local YMCA instructor comes in each Monday at lunchtime to take a great group of girls for a challenging session.
- We have also launched a Junior **basketball** competition which runs twice weekly in the lower gym. It is awesome to see basketballers of all abilities taking part and seeing a healthy but competitive culture develop. Spectator and coach behaviour at College Sport Association competitions

Below is a press release from College Sport, the organising body for all interschool competitions for secondary school competitions in Greater Auckland.

"It is disappointing that at this early stage of the winter sport season, there have been several incidents involving referee abuse. The abuse has involved both coaches and supporters.

Abuse of a match official is unacceptable. In many cases these match officials are unpaid volunteers.

College Sport Auckland has a Statement of Integrity and Code of Conduct at the start of its <u>Bylaws</u>. One of the key messages is to "uphold the spirit of fair play and sportsmanship in any CSA competition". **Respect of all officials, colleagues, coaches, players, supporters and opponents is not negotiable.**"

Ruaby

Lynfield College kicked off the 2019 rugby season with the 1st XV playing Mangere College in foggy and tricky conditions at Mangere College. The match was a hard fought and tough battle for the first 20 minutes with neither team scoring and Lynfield on defence for long periods of time. Finally, Mangere College gave away a penalty kick just outside their 22 to give TJ Piacun an opportunity to kick for goal and give Lynfield a 3-0 lead.

With 15 minutes left in the first half, Lynfield put Mangere College under more pressure and built phases in Mangere's 22. Eventually Mangere College defence was broken with a big a bust from Daniel with boys behind him to get him over the try-line to make it 8-0 to Lynfield. A missed conversion meant it was 8-0 at half time to Lynfield – both teams struggling with the conditions and keeping hold of the ball.

The second half started the same as the first - no scoring in the opening exchanges. Lynfield College's defence was breached twice in the later stage of the second half with 2 trys to Mangere - both unconverted, giving Mangere College a two point lead with 5 minutes to go. Lynfield then started building phases in the Mangere College 22m area and Mangere cracked giving a penalty away with time just about up. Under some extra pressure from the small crowd and the 1st XV Mangere College boys standing behind TJ, he stepped up and kicked the ball through the middle of the post to give Lynfield a 1 point lead 11/10. Mangere College rushed back to halfway and kicked off quickly deep into the right hand corner, trying to put pressure on Lynfield with only seconds left. But a high tackle from this play resulted in penalty reward to Lynfield. Nick asked the referee if time was up, and the answer was yes. TJ took the tap and kick the ball well into touch, and the referee blew the fulltime whistle. MVP points were awarded to: Nick (3), Xanthian (2), Jaysheel (1)

The 1st XV's second game of the season was against Liston College. Both teams had good wins in the opening round, so this was going to be huge game for both teams each wanting to continue their winning way into round 3. The match was a hard fought, tough battle for the first 30 minutes with neither team scoring and Lynfield on defence for long periods of time. But simple errors from both teams when on attack let the pressure off. We dominated the scrum and were rewarded with a penalty just short of the Liston College try line. Lynfield College took another scrum, and ball was won and passed along the backline. Andrew Barrowman crossed in the corner for the opening try giving us a halftime lead of 5/0. The opening 15 minutes of the 2nd half took a similar pattern to the first half - both teams making some simple errors and letting the pressure off at the wrong time. With 20 minutes to go Liston won a ball that was bouncing around after no one could claim it securely from the lineout on the halfway line, and ran through a couple of LC players and crossed for their opening try. They converted it to lead 7/5. The game was tight and tense for the next 10 minutes with both teams having a real crack at breaking the other to secure victory. But LC couldn't break down the Liston College defence. Liston College ran in 2 quick tries in the last 5 minutes to take the victory 17/5. It was tough game, and the boys never game up throughout. It was great to get some younger boys out on the field. Thanks also to all the parent support on the side-line. The boys really appreciate it.
