If you are unable to attend, you will have another opportunity to meet with teachers and form teachers at the progress conferences on Thursday 4 and Tuesday 9 April.

Year 9 Form Teachers have indicated that students have settled in well to their form classes and their subjects. The Orientation Programme, which ran at the beginning of the term, was very successful and students are certainly taking advantage of the many opportunities available to them in the College. Year 9 Form Teachers stay with their form classes as they move through the year levels.

On Thursday 14 February we held the Badges Assembly at which our 2019 Student Executive were presented with their badges of office. Thank you to parents and caregivers who attended this very special event. I wish these students a very successful and rewarding year.



Lynfield College is a BYOD school. Students and staff continue to explore the opportunities that these devices bring to student learning. The level of collaboration between students has certainly increased as has student access to up to date data in their research projects.

The College does lend out devices (Chromebooks) to students who are unable to bring a device for a specific reason, however it cannot be taken home. In the junior school we are recommending Chromebooks. These can be purchased for less than \$400. For seniors we do encourage a laptop, depending on their option subjects. We do not expect students to have expensive software loaded on as there are always free downloads that can be used. If in doubt about any device issue, please contact your child's Dean.

As part of the Year 9 orientation programme, students had workshops on accessing the school network and learning how to store work on Google Drive. The College will be doing a digital safety programme with all juniors throughout the year. We encourage all families to use our online payments system through the College website [www.lynfield.school.nz](http://www.lynfield.school.nz). At the top of the Home page there is a link to the Parent Portal where you can pay for course costs, sports fees, itinerant music lessons, course trips, camps and other school outings and the General Purpose donation. Payment is made by credit card through the Parent Portal Fees tab, which incurs a surcharge or by Direct Credit through your own banking website. If you wish to pay by direct credit into the College's bank account, please make sure you place your students ID number in the reference.

Uniform and stationery items (including work books) can be paid through the Shop link at the top of our website home page. Shop purchases can be paid by credit card or direct credit. If paying by direct credit into the College's bank account for Shop purchases – please place the order number generated by the purchase as reference e.g. ORD 0001.

Receipts for credit card payments are issued through the Parent Portal and the Shop link.

Receipts for direct credit payments may be viewed and printed through the Fees tab of the Parent Portal, however you will receive a confirmation email for goods when ordering through the Shop link.

### **General Purpose Donation**

The General Purpose donation is \$190 per child or \$270 per family. The donation, approved annually by the Board of Trustees, is the parents' contribution to the school's operational funding and is the major source of funding for the library, sports and cultural activities and other items, such as extending computer access, water fountains, shade, outside seating. In addition, a number of our classrooms and classroom upgrades have been funded by the Board of Trustees from the General Purpose donation, e.g. Science Labs, Music Rehearsal Room, etc.

Keep the receipt for Income Tax refund purposes. The Board is most grateful to those parents who have already paid their General Purpose donation and subject material fees.

An ID card costs \$7.00, to be paid at the Accounts Office or through the Parent Portal. It is not essential for school, but is required to access photocopying and can be used for age verification use on public transport, at cinemas, etc.

### **NCEA Results 2018**

2018 saw some great results achieved by our Year 11,12 and 13 students in Level 1, 2 and 3 respectively.

#### **Highlights:**

Year 11: 81% gained L1 certificate

Of these 21% had their level certificate endorsed with Excellence and 40% endorsed with Merit.

Year 12: 79% gained L2 certificate

Of these 19% had their level certificate endorsed with Excellence and 29% endorsed with Merit.

Year 13: 72% gained L3 certificate and 62% gained UE, which is above the national statistics of 45% for decile 4-7 schools.

Of those receiving their L3 certificate 23% were endorsed with Excellence and 34% at Merit.

## So you think you can keep up with your teenager?

Our School Counsellors will be facilitating a Parenting Programme for 5 consecutive Tuesdays starting on 19 February from 7.00 to 8.30pm, in the staffroom. Each week there will be a focus:

Week 1 - Understanding the developmental stages of teenagers and parenting styles

Week 2 - Communication

Week 3 - Setting limits and consequences

Week 4 - Risky behaviours, including internet dangers

Week 5 - Teenage mental health

We are asking that, if you are able, you contribute \$15 (per family attending) to cover some costs involved in photocopying and providing supper. This can be paid at the Accounts Office, through the Parent Portal or online.

While we will provide you with material on each of the above, we certainly do not presume to teach you to be "perfect parents". Rather, we are hoping that there will be lively discussion and sharing of ideas among the participants, with each of you taking from this what seems right for you. It would not be appropriate to have children attend the programme and unfortunately we are not able to guarantee a childcare service at the College while you are participating in the sessions.

## 2019 Senior Leadership and Team Building Course

## World Vision Senior Scholarship Week (Lily Chen Year 13)

World Vision is characterised by their organisation of the annual 40 Hour Famine, which is recognised as New Zealand's largest youth fundraising event. Ensuing from the zealous efforts of Lynfield College students, our cohort managed to collate enough funds to be identified as one of New Zealand's top performing schools in last year's 40 Hour Famine; an impressive feat earning us a coveted scholarship spot, offered for the purpose of training participants to explore the potentials of humanitarian activism.

Receiving the nomination myself came as an absolute shock, but it provided me with the freedom to further my pursuit for social justice and expand my scope of understanding pertaining to international relations, so I could learn to be a conscientious global citizen, which I believe, is a moral responsibility we should all uphold. Especially due to the convoluted connections between our homeland and destabilised countries in the third world, which are rife with vulnerable populations, in desperate need for drastic improvements.

My attendance at World Vision's Senior Scholarship Week united me with a classroom full of compassionate souls, all enthusiastic to establish the progressive change we want to see in our world. Such a congregation of remarkable minds served me endless insight, wisdom, and nuanced discourse on a silver platter during every group discussion, always leaving me hankering for more. Another highlight was the daily lectures, delivered by inspirational speakers from all across the globe, carrying such a raw poignancy from their experiences on poverty-stricken territories, which only proliferates their pride in activist work. Unsurprisingly, I was astounded by the sheer gravity of systemic injustice, so it was rather confrontational to exit my bubble of privilege when actualising the catastrophic realities surrounding us. If I had a dollar for every stifled sob within that classroom, poverty would be easily eradicated.

Participating in the 40 Hour Famine strives to alleviate human suffering via an inclusive approach, which prioritises the voices within local communities, by effectively allocating profits according to precedence. Utilising my newfound knowledge and motivation, I hope to invest all resources available into hosting another life-changing 40 Hour Famine within Lynfield College this year, with an agenda to raise as much money as possible, for our counterparts in South Sudan.

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### **Security at the College**

CCTV cameras are installed around the College to assist student safety. Cameras also monitor movement in the school grounds at nights and in the weekends. There are also a few cameras inside buildings at strategic locations to provide protection for student property.

#### **Please keep the following in mind**

- Students and members of the public should only be in the grounds after dark when attending organised functions.
- Any rubbish brought into the grounds should be taken away and disposed of at home.
- Any community groups wishing to use College facilities such as the sports fields, cricket nets, etc, need to contact the Business manager.
- Access to the school should be through one of the three gates and never over the fences that surround the College or through our neighbouring properties.
- Access to the fields after hours should only be through gate 2 on the lower White Swan Road entrance.

### **A Safe Environment at Lynfield College**

- **Peer Support Programme** – This programme was run during the Y9 Orientation. The feedback has been very encouraging and the Peer Support Leaders will remain connected to their allocated Y9 classes during the course of the year.

## How you can make a difference

For many years, Lynfield College has monitored and endeavoured to improve the physical and emotional safety of all its students and staff. There is no room for complacency here, particularly in this technological age of rapid and unsupervised electronic communication which allows more subtle and often undetectable bullying.

At the start of the year, we are really concerned that the students settle quickly into school and enthusiastically into their learning. Parents of Year 9 students are likely to be particularly anxious that their children transition well from their intermediate schools.

We encourage all parents to talk with their children about how their year has started, and invite any caregivers concerned about the possible bullying or isolation of their children to contact the school as soon as possible. ## Gateway Programme – still open for 2019 applications

The Gateway Programme provides opportunities for 50 Year 12 and Year 13 students to participate in workplace learning one day a week for approximately 5-10 weeks during the school year. It delivers hands-on practical learning that leads to nationally recognised qualifications and Vocational Pathway Awards (minimum 20 NCEA credits). It helps students gain important work and life-long learning skills in preparation for the transition from school to study or work. Students need to display a commitment to independent learning and have a good idea of the industry they wish to explore. Learning can be assessed in the workplace and is a great opportunity to blend school study with the workplace learning and experience. ## PhotoLife Online Ordering System

The Lynfield College class photos and ID photos are scheduled for **Thursday 28 February** and will be available for you to view and order online with PhotoLife Studios after that date.

Your son or daughter will bring home an online slip with their unique Shoot Key detailed on it. This Shoot Key will automatically display your child's class photograph. It is then an easy process for you to shop online and purchase the photograph you want. The College will also receive a number of order envelopes for those of you who do not have access to the internet or do not wish to use this system.

If you place your order within two weeks of receiving your Shoot Key you will receive free delivery for your photo orders. PhotoLife has agreed to despatch all the orders back to the school and your child will bring the photographs home.

Any orders placed after this period will be sent directly to your specified delivery address and will incur a \$5.00 postage & packing charge. You will see this message when you go online to view and order your photographs.

## Itinerant Music Lessons (Instrumental)

Most instrument lessons are now full. There are some spaces for flute, trumpet, trombone and clarinet. All students who have signed up, but have not yet been placed in a music lesson, are on a waiting list and will be notified through their form teacher if space becomes available.

Please note that if your son/daughter is taking part in itinerant music lessons there is a \$20 materials cost for the year. If they are also renting an instrument there is a rental cost of \$20 - \$30 per term depending on the instrument. The materials cost and hireage cost are both payable to the Accounts Office or online through the Parent Portal by the end of March.

### Standard Music Groups

**Choir** is on Monday lunchtimes in the rehearsal studio. New students are welcome. This group will attend the Big Sing held at the town hall in early June and play in the school Variety Concert in Term 3.

**Stage Band** is on Friday lunchtimes in the rehearsal studio. Students who have played saxophone, trumpet, trombone, bass, drums, guitar and/or piano are welcome to join. This group will play at the school Jazz and Soul Concert and compete in the Auckland Secondary Schools Jazz Band Competition, both in Term 3.

**Concert Band** is on Wednesday lunchtimes in the rehearsal studio. New members who have played a woodwind or brass instrument for 1 year or more are welcome, auditions will only be held if there are too many students. This group will perform at a school concert in July and attend the KBB Music Festival in August.

**Development Strings (including flutes)** is on Thursday lunchtimes in the rehearsal studio. This group is aimed at students who have played violin, viola, cello or flute for approximately 1-2 years. New members are very welcome.

**Chamber Orchestra** is on Mondays after school in the rehearsal studio. Students who have played violin, cello or double bass for 2 years or more are welcome. This group will perform at a school concert in July and attend the KBB Music Festival in August.

### **Premier Music Groups**

**Big Band** is on Tuesday afterschool. New students will be auditioned and should register their interest at the music office. This band will attend the KBB Festival in August where they have been gala finalists for the last 9 years in a row. They will also play at the school Jazz n Soul Concert.

**Jazz Combo** is on Wednesday afterschool. New students will be auditioned and should register their interest at the music office. This band will attend the Auckland Jazz Band competition in Term 3 where they have been finalists or winners every year since the competition began 6 years ago. They will also play at the school Jazz n Soul Concert.

**LC Jazz Project** is on Tuesday lunchtime. This group is a pathway to the award winning Jazz Comb. New students should register their interest at the Music Office. The band will attend the Auckland Jazz Band competition and play at the school Jazz n Soul Concert, both in Term 3.
