It was with pleasure that we welcomed back our staff and 78% of our students on Monday. The number of students returning to onsite learning has steadily increased over the week so we look forward to seeing more of our students back in classrooms next week.

Wearing masks has become normalised with some real creativity on display with a number being home sewn. Students wishing to make their own masks will be supported in doing so by one of our trainee teachers who will be offering workshops during lunch breaks next week.

As part of the Health and Safety guidelines being followed, hard surfaces are cleaned regularly throughout the day and students are asked to sanitise on the way in and out of the classroom. Should any student wish to do additional cleaning, disinfectant is readily available in all teaching spaces. Water fountains are currently taped off. However bottles are able to be filled. Please make sure your child brings a bottle to school. Water purchases can be made at the tuckshop. For those who haven't yet checked out online purchasing orders, these can be placed and paid for in advance for the week ahead (www.schoollunches.co.nz).

Next week we celebrate Tongan Language Week. This has been a particularly challenging year for our Culture Groups with our annual Culture Day being cancelled. We are hoping to have returned to Alert Level 1 (or 1.5) by week 10 so that our Cultural Fashion Parade and Cultural Mufti Day (originally scheduled for Term 1) can proceed.

Planning for 2021 classes is well underway. We have had 1414 students log into the course selection platform and 6440 courses selected which is amazing as it gives us a clear picture for planning classes. SENIOR ASSESSMENT WEEK - WEDNESDAY 16 - TUESDAY 22 SEPTEMBER

These practice exams are for *externally* assessed standards only, not internally assessed standards and are not the only evidence that can be used for a derived grade. A course does not have to assess all standards during Senior Assessment Week. Students have been issued with a timetable and examination instructions. The timetable is also on the College website https://tinyurl.com/September-Practice-Exams

The morning assessment time slot starts at 8.40am and the afternoon time slot starts at 1.00pm. Students should arrive at least 10 minutes before the start of each assessment. ALL assessments must be attended. When students do not have an assessment they are encouraged to not be at school. They can come to school and work in a study room if needed. These are **B3** and **L2**.

Should your son/daughter not be able to attend one of their timetabled assessments, for sickness or other reasons, please ring the College absence line before their assessment starts. If a student is sick, it is best to obtain a medical certificate.

It is important that students are fully prepared for these exams by:

- > Knowing their assessment timetable highlight each assessment
- Seeing Ms Ram (E block) immediately if they have any clashes (do not leave it until exams start)
- > Carefully reading the Examination Instructions for Students information
- Students are to wear full and correct uniform at all times while at school

ASD SEASON WRAP-UP

Congratulations to the two Lynfield Debating teams who reached the Semi-finals of the Advanced Open and Premier Junior Grades in the Auckland Schools' Debating competition.

Advanced Open

Lynfield 1: Aashish Ramanlal (Y12), Rahul Reddy and Aiken Shadbolt (Y13s) Lynfield 2: Eliana Competente, Jasmine Pickston and Michael Jury (Y12s)

Two Advanced Open teams (above) competed in the Quarter-final online on Tuesday night. The moot was "This house would legally obligate children to give a percentage of their income to their parents in old age." Unfortunately, Lynfield 1 lost their debate to Selwyn 1.

Lynfield 2 successfully negated the moot and moved directly to the Semi-final that immediately followed. The moot was "This house would allocate places at schools through a lottery system rather than by school zones." In what was a very high-quality and difficult debate to affirm, a 2-1 split decision was awarded to Selwyn 1.

Premier Junior

Congratulations to Heather Mitchinson, Zoya Qureshi and Sophie Yang for winning their Quarter-final debate Wednesday night 19 August against Westlake Girls. They successfully affirmed the moot "This house regrets docu-dramas that "put people on trial" after their exoneration or death (e.g. Leaving Neverland about Michael Jackson, The People v O. J. Simpson, The Disappearance of Madeleine McCann)".

They competed in the Semi-finals Wednesday night 26 August, also online, against the undefeated Westlake Boys 1. The moot was "That children should have the right to leave their parents for foster care under the state". In what was an incredibly outstanding debate, resulting in a 2-1 split decision by the three judges, Lynfield lost to Westlake Boys 1.

We are very proud of all of the Lynfield debaters who have persevered through the challenges of lockdown and the shift to debating online.

THE NEW ZEALAND MATHEMATICAL OLYMPIAN (NZMO)

Congratulations to Evan Huang (Y9) who has made it to round 2 in this national competition. Round one consisted of a take home exam (a set of 8 problems) which lasts approximately one month. Participation is open to any New Zealand intermediate or secondary level student. Round 2 is a three hour exam in September. Participation at this level is by invitation only, based on results of round 1. The results of both rounds of the NZMO will be used to select about 25 students to participate in the NZMOC training camp, held at the University of Auckland in January. UNIVERSITY OF AUCKLAND SUPPORT FOR AUCKLAND SECONDARY SCHOOL STUDENTS AFFECTED BY COVID-19

The University of Auckland has advised that in recognition of the impact of Covid-19 they will be providing further support in addition to the previously advised changed entry requirements for 2021.

This will include catch-up credits on campus over summer for those who have not achieved UE. Details of the full range of additional supports are still to be provided.

Do have conversations with Mrs Keir, Mr Christie, Mr Waddington and/or your teachers if your plans included attending University of Auckland but you have concerns about meeting their requirements.

VOTING IN THE NZ GENERAL ELECTION

- 1. Will you be 18 years or older on 17 October 2020?
- 2. Are you a NZ citizen / permanent resident?
- 3. Are you living in NZ?

If you have answered yes to all 3 then you need to register to vote in this year's election https://vote.nz/

There will be some students who were originally not eligible to vote (when the election was scheduled for 19 September) but now will be due to the rescheduled election date now being 17 October.

ASSESSMENT UPDATE

We are aware that due to the disruption of Covid 19, many of our students need more time to complete their assessment work.

NCEA Level 1 and 2 Achievement in 2020

Both of these NCEA qualifications can be achieved across two years. They do not have to be achieved in a calendar year. If your child does not achieve a Level Certificate this year, they will not have to repeat the year.

As a school we will continue to find opportunities to support our students to achieve their NCEA Certificates this year.

We are doing this in a range of ways:

- We have reduced the number of standards in some courses.
- We have found alternative standards if required i.e. replacing those that required field work.
- We are offering extra workshops and time outside timetabled classes for practical subjects to complete portfolios (Arts and Technology).
- We have modified our assessment practices by gathering assessment evidence (for internals and externals) in a variety of ways, to meet the needs of the student's situation e.g. oral, visual, as well as written.
- We have modified our timetable. This has meant longer periods to focus on practical work. We will also be using our
 extended 90-minute periods to assess students for practice externals and derived grades if teaching has not been
 completed by Assessment Week this term.
- We will be giving students who still need to complete assessments at the end of the year, opportunities to do this.

Students should speak to their subject teachers to discuss specific assessment arrangements.

NZQA Changes and Guidelines for 2020

With Covid-19 bringing a significant disturbance to this year it is important to know and understand the new NZQA changes that will impact on you this year. This is a simplified guide to help you understand the new changes, but for further questions and greater understanding refer to our Careers Counsellor Mrs Wendy Keir.

Exam Date Changes

- NCEA and New Zealand scholarships will start on **Monday 16 November** and end on **Wednesday 9 December**
- The requirement for NZQA verification of Level 1 and 2 Visual Arts portfolios has been removed giving students more time to complete their work
- Students that need to submit portfolios for their courses ave had their submission date extended to **Thursday 12 November** 2020.

Endorsement Changes and University Entrance

- The number of credits now required to get an overall endorsement is **46 credits** at merit or excellence level.
- Now you only need **12 credits** at excellence or merit in order to gain course endorsement.
- Your Learning Recognition credits cannot count towards an endorsement.
- University Entrance requirements have also changed due to Covid-19 hence students this year only need **12 credits** in **each** of the three university approved subjects. However literacy and numeracy requirements have not changed.

Learning Recognition Credits

- These credits are given by NZQA in acknowledgment for students affected by Covid-19. The Learning Recognition Credits will be calculated in January 2021.
- For every 5 credits you achieve in an internal or external assessment you are entitled to one Learning Recognition Credit.
- Level 1 students can get a maximum of 10 learning recognition credits. Level 2 and 3 students can get a maximum of 8 Learning Recognition Credits.
- These credits are not graded or linked to a specific standard but these credits along with the credits you gain will go towards your NCEA qualification.

Derived Grades

If for some reason, you cannot sit your external examinations at the end of the year (due to sickness or bereavement), your final grade for those standards will be taken from the **HIGHEST** grade you have achieved throughout the year. This could either be from your practice exam, topic test, or evidence that has been carried out in class (under assessment condition), throughout the year.
