We were very relieved to be able to hold our Senior Prizegiving onsite as scheduled last Tuesday evening and were delighted to see a full hall. The speakers during the evening all acknowledged the support that they had been given by their teachers throughout the year and how much they appreciated the extra efforts made on their behalf.

Despite 2020 being a Covid affected year, the scholarships that our students were awarded reached a combined total of \$238,500. A considerable increase on last year's \$219,500 and a tribute to the quality of the applications the students submitted.

We would particularly like to recognise and thank the new sponsors that have contributed to these scholarships. Most of these have been past pupils. It is heartwarming to have them approach us with this generosity.

Wednesday 11 November saw the ***Smokefree Environments and Regulated Products (Vaping) Amendment Act 2020*** come into force. This means that both smoking and vaping are prohibited on school grounds. Students are also reminded that banned items at school include fireworks, lighters, cigarettes, equipment used for smoking, vape devices, and weapons (including pocket-knives and toy/fake weapons).

## NCEA ADMISSION SLIPS

The NCEA admission slips and candidate information sheets for external exams were issued to students in their form classes.

- Students must check and confirm that their entries are correct. If entries are missing, they must see Ms Harris as soon as possible.
- Students should use the NZQA Learner Login at [www.nzqa.govt.nz/login/](http://www.nzqa.govt.nz/login/) to check their address. If a change of address is required, please let Ms Harris know **immediately**. This will ensure any booklets/materials are returned to the candidate's correct address in January - February 2021.
- Students need to keep their Admission Slip in a safe place and to **bring it to every examination. They must not write on it or share it with anyone.** If a student loses their admission slip it can be reprinted either by the student using their Student Login or by Ms Harris. Ms Harris must sign all reprints.

## STUDY SKILLS AND STRATEGIES FOR STUDENTS

Exams are a stressful time for our senior students. You might be wondering what you can do to help your child during this time. Here are a few ideas:

### 1. Co-create a study timetable

Help your teenager create a study timetable that will work for your family. You could create this with a program such as Notion. Notion is an all in one workspace for notes, tasks, calendar events, to do lists, reading lists etc. It can be used across devices with a mobile version app as well as the desktop version.

### 2. Encourage your teen to avoid distractions

It is really easy to get distracted especially when working online. Limit or Stayfocused are easy to use extensions for the Google Chrome browser that allows you to limit the time spent on a particular website such as Facebook, YouTube or Instagram.

### 3. Create a suitable study environment

Set up a space for studying that is free from distractions such as the kitchen and television. An area that is well lit and ventilated is ideal.

### 4. Ensure your teen gets enough sleep

Getting enough sleep is fundamental to doing well in school, particularly during exams. Research shows that during exam times 9 out of 10 teenagers take their devices to bed with them. This can result in them replacing sleeping time with time spent on social media.

### 5. Exercise and relaxation

Keeping a healthy body and mind during the exam period is also important. There are a number of different apps out there that students can use for relaxation and exercise. Insight Timer is a free meditation app and Fiton is a Netflix style library of free workout videos, if your teenager would benefit from some exercise during their study break.

This was linked in with our school values:

**Wairua Kaha** with the focus on 'We are Leaders'. Students, staff and anyone in our community can be a leader, they do not need to be wearing a badge or a uniform to be a leader. #### Individual Honours

**Tom Christie (Y10)** recently competed in a McKinnon Shield event run by Auckland Athletics. He broke his own *Auckland U16 100m hurdles record*. His run was only 0.7s outside the NZ record!! He also holds the Auckland 80m hurdles record for U16.

**Neel Kumar(Y10)** again this year ran the 5km race in ASB Marathon and took the 2nd spot, just 2 seconds behind 1<sup>st</sup> place.

**Elena Latoa (Y10)** was selected to play for Auckland Basketball but only played a few games before lockdown and the team hasn't restarted. Now she plays for TABA (Tonga Aotearoa Basketball Assoc.) She played under 15's for First Nations tournament Oct 9-11 at Trusts Stadium and her team won the final for under 15 girls. She recently played in the U16 girls division in "Hoop Nations" which is said to be the biggest basketball event in NZ.

**Stanley Long (Y11)** was selected to play in an ITF tennis tournament in Hamilton last weekend.

**Katya Blong (Y10) won a GOLD medal** as a member of an NOC Ice Hockey team at the **Youth Winter Olympics** - first NZ gold medal at a Youth Winter Olympics.

Katya went to the US to play Ice Hockey last September with the intention of staying there indefinitely. Due to Covid Katya's school sending all the students home and finishing the school year and exams remotely, Katya is back at Lynfield in 10KJ.

In early January she was a member of the NZ Women U18 Ice Hockey team competing at the World Championship IIB In Mexico City, Mexico. She then went on to the Youth Winter Olympics officially known as the **III Winter Youth Olympic Games**, a major international multi-sport event and cultural festival for teenagers held in Lausanne, Switzerland, 9 - 22 January 2020. Katya competed in a Mixed-NOC team consisting of athletes representing different National Olympic Committees (NOCs) and therefore different countries. This unique format sees 13 players from 13 different countries play in a 3x3 ice hockey tournament. There are huge challenges as they have never played together before and often don't speak the same language! <https://www.olympic.org.nz/news/new-zealand-team-wins-first-ever-gold-medal-at-winter-youth-olympic-games/>

This new initiative of making up teams of players from countries who can't send team to Olympics was a huge success. All players around the world had to do a qualifying test and get ranked. Teams were then made up very evenly depending where the player ranked. Katya was only English-speaking player in her team.

Since returning to NZ Katya won another gold medal in October when she represented Auckland in the U18 boys team, and a silver in the Auckland Women's team and was named "Best U18 Player in NZ".

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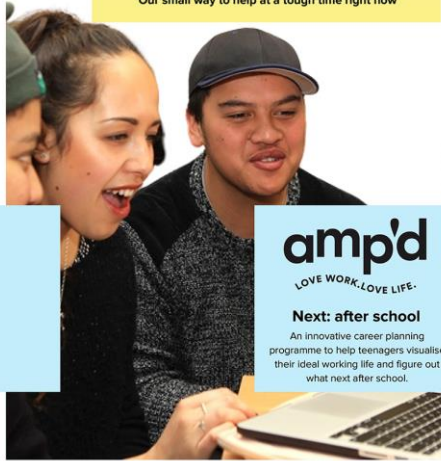

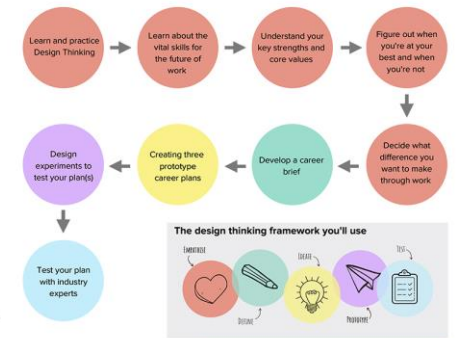
