Kia ora koutou

Anyone driving past Gate 1 this morning will have seen that our long-awaited sign upgrade is finally underway. Funded by the School Investment Package, the upgraded sign is expected to be operational next term. This one-off funding was made available to schools for Ministry of Education approved property upgrade works. Other projects that this one-off funding has covered includes air conditioning in F and G Blocks, turf surfacing of the asphalt courts, fencing around the upgraded turf facilities, two new sunshades and security gates on White Swan Rd.

This week our focus has been whanaungatanga tika - we are collaborative. At the year level assemblies, I have spoken about student agency and collaboration in action. During the LynCed weeks at the end of 2020, one of the student projects focused on reducing the amount of heavy metals reaching landfill. As a consequence of their work the school has organised for battery recycling. Students can bring these in from home and place them in the container which is currently in Admin. We congratulate the group on their initiative. In addition to this, larger electronic items (eg computers, DVD players, etc) can be brought to the eWaste collection in the school carpark on Saturday 10 July. https://www.computerrecycling.co.nz/cr-e-days/

Our staff are currently looking at the upcoming changes to Level 1 from 2023 as part of the NCEA Change Package, and the impact on our Year 9 and 10 students as they move through the school. This will be the focus of the next Ministry of Education Teacher Only Day, Tuesday 10 August. With such significant changes approaching, we are taking the opportunity to review our teaching and learning programmes to ensure they are engaging students in their learning and building them for success at Level 2 and beyond. Consultation with the community and students will begin in Term 3 with our current Year 9 cohort as they will be the first to be affected by the changes when they reach Year 11 in 2023.

This will be the last Newsletter for Term 2. Our focus for Week 10 will be in supporting our students in making safe decisions and in supporting their friends to make safe decisions. Over the past fortnight students have been reminded about the consequences of vaping on the school grounds or being in possession of banned items. Unfortunately, there have been some discipline responses taken related to this. If you are looking for ways to open a conversation about vaping with your child this resource may give you some good ideas (https://dontgetsuckedin.co.nz)

Watertightness (leaky building) work on the Lower Gym has uncovered further timber which will need replacing. While this work is progressed the Lower Gym will be closed for use. Fortunately the YMCA is within walking distance and the 90 minute teaching blocks will allow some of the lessons to be delivered in the YMCA facilities.

We are delighted that our school fields are holding up well to winter sports use and invite you to join us for the home games this Saturday: 1st VX Rugby at 9.15am and 2nd XI Football boys, at 10am.

All enrolments are to be completed online. Online enrolments open on Thursday 1 July 2021.

All students living within the In Zone area are entitled to enrol if they are eligible domestic students. A map and list of streets can be found at www.lynfield.school.nz/enrolment.html or are available at the school office.

Please note: In Zone applications must be submitted by 25 August 2021 to help us determine final Out of Zone places available.

Well done to all students who were excellent ambassadors for Lynfield and all played with great enthusiasm.


TALANOA EVENING

SENIOR TE REO MĀORI CLASSES VISIT RANGIRIRI

Our cluster Te Kahui Kaiako Reo Māori in Tamaki continues to grow. We currently have eight kura across Tamaki represented at our various hui, supported by Ako Panuku. Kaiako think it is important to develop a space for our akonga to whakawhanaunga (develop positive relationships) in an environment which collaboratively supports Reo Māori, Kaupapa Māori including Te hitori o Aotearoa, Kapa haka and Mahi toi and on Wednesday 30 June we travelled to Rangiriri. Lynfield akonga said:

I learnt about Rangiriri and what had happened to our ancestors.

It broke everyone's heart because of what our Maori ancestors suffered from.

How we must appreciate what we have today.

The Māori made deep trenches there and did a very good job defending against the British.

It was great to learn and experience what happened at Rangiriri. I enjoyed learning more about what happened to our people and also what happened on that land.

I believe the stories about Rangiriri should be told more to inform everyone about the true history of Aotearoa.

NZQA - STUDENT ASSESSMENT GUIDES

The following are reminders from Student Assessment Guides (on Schoology and the school's website).

Meeting a Deadline and Extension Applications

- All work MUST be submitted on or before the due date.
- The deadline will be indicated on the assignment. It is the student's responsibility to make sure their work is submitted by the deadline.
- · Failure to meet the due date may result in 'Not Achieved'.
- If there are special circumstances that means work cannot be submitted by the due date, an extension <u>can be requested before the due date</u>. A valid reason is needed to be granted an extension. (e.g. medical, bereavement, representing NZ; NOT an overseas holiday). Please note, for practical assessments and experiments, it may not always be possible for an extension to be granted. An Extension Application form is available from the subject Faculty Leader/Head of Department or the Deputy Principal (Ms Harris).

Breach of Assessment Rules

Breaking assessment rules and misconduct during an assessment is taken very seriously. Students are expected to follow written and verbal instructions.

A breach includes:

- Submitting another person's work and pretending it is your own (plagiarism) will not be tolerated. This includes copying
 another student's work, allowing someone to copy your work or copying from resource material without identifying the
 source.
- Communicating with someone else in any way during a test or exam.
- Inappropriate use of a mobile phone or device (this includes having the phone on their person and/or not switching them off).
- Taking notes and handouts into an exam.
- Students are expected to follow the assessment instructions this includes written and verbal instructions issued as part of the assessment process.

The course of action if a breach is proven could also include some or all of the following:

A warning.

A result of 'Not Achieved'.

Reported to NZQA.

Resubmitting the work under the HoDs or PN's supervision.

Information being passed on to the HoDs of other option classes.

Work in other parts of the subject re-evaluated.

Work in other subjects re-evaluated.

Staff will monitor the progress of student work to prove authenticity – attendance in class and meeting milestones are particularly important to enable authenticity to be verified. When handing in assessments a student will need to sign the Authenticity Section on the front of the coversheet.



UN YOUTH NEW ZEALAND

Two UN Youth civic and leadership summits over the coming months are events open to all high school students, regardless of previous experience or knowledge.

What is UN Youth NZ?

United Nations Youth New Zealand is the largest youth-for-youth charity in Aotearoa, providing civics education outside the traditional classroom context. Annually, over 3,000 young New Zealanders from Northland to Southland attend a UN Youth event, run by a body of 150 volunteers across the country who dedicate many hours of their time to engaging young people and growing the organisation.

What is Raise Your Voice?

RYV explores civic engagement and local governance, where rangatahi from around Tāmaki gain insight on how they can be active citizens on a local level.

What is New Zealand Model Parliament?

NZ Model Parliament is an event similar to Raise Your Voice in that it deals with pressing issues but at a national level, designed for high school students to experience the parliamentary process as a change-maker.
