Five Hospitality students participated in the Auckland Regional Hospitality competition on 7 July 2021 that was held at MIT, Otara. The students ranged from Year 11 - Year 13 and impressed the judges in their various categories.

In the Café Style Cakes category, Khushi Patel presented a three-layer vanilla cake with salted caramel buttercream, filled with apple sauce, decorated with a caramel drip and topped with a ring of crumble. Finally, swirls of buttercream were garnished with apple crisps, apple syrup and toffee shards and won a Gold medal.

Also in the Café Style Cakes category, Sharon Bedingfield's Vanilla cake with lemon curd French buttercream, a filling of Raspberry jam inside and a lemon curd drip on the outside secured her a Gold medal.

Ella Fletcher showcased her technical skills in the Barista category and achieved a Bronze medal.

The Kiwi Classic Biscuits category were represented by Emilia Parker and Sarah Whitefield 11BR. Emilia won a silver medal for her entry of Afghan and Anzac biscuits and Sarah was awarded a gold medal and Top of the Class for her category.

These students have shown again remarkable talent and technical skills during the preparation and final competition. Well done!

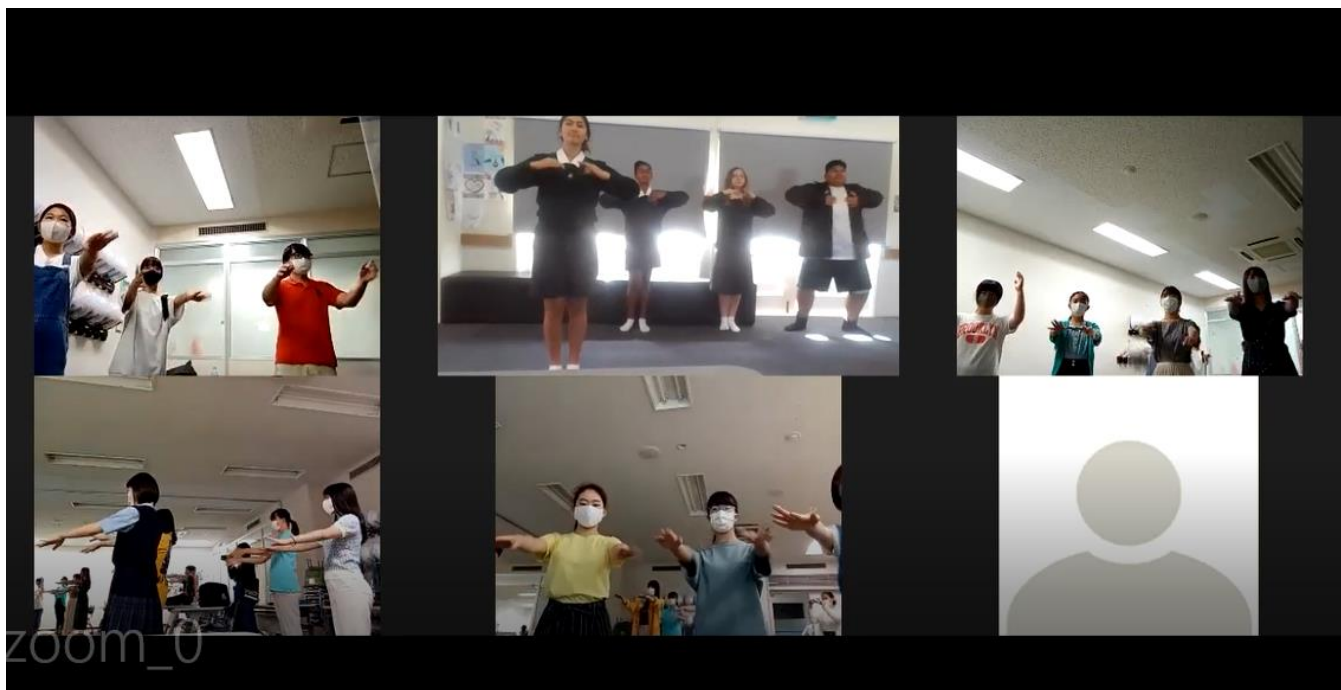
VIRTUAL SHINAGAWA SUMMER SCHOOL

Lynfield College hosts 30 students from Shinagawa, Tokyo, for two weeks each August during Japan's summer holiday break. With travel between our two countries being interrupted by COVID, online sessions were trialled as an alternative. Keeping the relationship between our two cities alive is important to us.

Shinagawa are usually welcomed onto the Lynfield College marae with a powhiri. Ms Kim and Whaea Leauga thought about how they could showcase the importance of this and found digital resources which showed the different parts of the powhiri so that manuhiri were able to see the ceremony in action. Reo Lessons with Whaea and a haka lesson with our kapa haka students was a fun way to connect with Shinagawa students and maintain whanaungatanga digitally.

In the English sessions Lorraine Delgrosso and Chris Bangs talked to students about their interests and then viewed part of a Kiwiana video, in which they learned about such Kiwi icons as the Silver Ferns, Auckland's volcanoes, L & P, and the all-important difference between Kiwis and kiwifruit. In Japan, kiwifruit is referred to simply as kiwi, so it's a good idea to avoid confusion. Students also learned a little Māori related to plants, such as ponga and pohutukawa, and some Kiwi slang such as "Sweet as" and "She'll be right!".

In Japanese class, Year 10 to 13 students participated in the Zoom session. Students were divided into given different topics to start the conversation. Despite unstable connection of the zoom, students really enjoyed the conversation with students in Japan and saw the importance of learning a foreign language. Our Lynfield College students were inclusive, respectful, and collaborated well with students in Japan, so the conversation sessions successfully demonstrated our school's values of Manaakitanga and Whanaungatanga tika. It was great to see students sharing their interests and inviting each other to their own country. Moreover, students were eager to learn more phrases so they can use the language with students in Japan. Overall, the Virtual Shinagawa Summer School Programme successfully uplifted students' engagement in language learning and it was a great time to appreciate each other's ahurea and Whanonga Pono.



Our international students sounded like they were really enjoying the discussion, a lot of laughs and chat. They were comparing stories about their lives, what it's like to be in NZ, how to make friends here, what the culture is like and how it's different to their home countries. What's trending, what games do they like (online games of course).

Year 13 students interested in studying Law visited Meredith Connell's offices in the Auckland CBD on Wednesday 4 August. The first session gave students an opportunity to hear about interesting legal topics and recent cases that young graduates, plus more experienced lawyers, have been involved in. It was an honour to have two MC Partners speak about their roles, Brian Dickey the Crown Solicitor at Auckland, as well as ex Lynfield College Nick Malarao who leads the Insolvency, Recoveries and Enforcement team. There was time for a Q & A session, so that students with burning questions could ask about studying or practicing law. Then students were served a corporate afternoon tea, followed by a tour of the offices to see where lawyers from different practice areas work.

Year 13 students are eligible to apply for a **Te Kuhunga Scholarship** if intending to study at any New Zealand University Law School.

This event took place at University of Auckland, Tūtahi Tonu Marae, Epsom Campus on Friday 6 August. Students were encouraged to focus on enhancing their life choices through exploring opportunities via career planning. FOUR LYNFIELD DEBATING TEAMS BREAK FOR THE FINALS

This year almost 50 students have competed in 13 teams in the preliminary rounds of the Auckland Secondary School Debating Competitions and they are to be congratulated for their commitment, effort and oratorical skills. Our thanks also go to Mrs Marshall, Mrs Carswell, Mr MacKenzie and Ms Barker for their coaching, encouragement and help. A big thanks also to Ms Barker for hosting the Western Region Junior Open at Lynfield College and to senior students Isha Ramanlal, Michael Jury, Sanat Singh and Aashish Ramanlal for their much-appreciated assistance as student adjudicators.

When the points are totalled for each team in a debating competition, teams are selected for the octo-finals or quarter-finals, depending on the overall number of teams competing. This is called the "break". When teams break, it means they have shown particularly strong thinking and planning, speaking skills and teamwork to make it to the qualifying groups of finalists. These are the qualifying teams:

Premier Advanced Lynfield 1: Isha Ramanlal, Sanat Singh, Sophie Yang. This team of seasoned debaters is currently ranked sixth in Auckland and therefore they are among the top teams overall, as premier advanced is the highest grade. Isha was also nominated one of the best speakers along with Michael Jury from PA Lynfield 2.

Advanced Open Lynfield 3: Eesha Mahimkar, Uday Jain and Sarka Ludvigova. This team has attained a very commendable second in Auckland. Uday was nominated as one of the top speakers in this grade.

Advanced Open Lynfield 2: Malisha Ghosh, Aashish Ramanlal, Rahul D'Souza and Heather Mitchinson. This team is currently tenth in Auckland.

Stop press! Both Advanced Open teams have just won their octo-finals.

Junior Open Lynfield 1: Sameera Daud, Reshma Tala, Seetha Veerappan, Nishikaa Thakkar. This team broke second in Auckland, which is a phenomenal achievement, given that they have been debating for only 18 months.

Junior Open Lynfield 4 missed the break by only 1 point and have been given a special mention by the organisers: Sanskriti Saha, Sandy Ganesh, Ayema Imran, Dhruvi Visnagara and Mia Bradley. This is a significant achievement, as these Year 9 students have been debating for only five months.

We look forward to vigorous debates in the finals competition and wish these teams all the best.

NZQA – STUDENT ASSESSMENT GUIDES

The following are reminders from Student Assessment Guides (on Schoology and the school's website).

Meeting a Deadline and Extension Applications

- All work **MUST** be submitted on or before the due date.
- The deadline will be indicated on the assignment. It is **the student's responsibility** to make sure their work is submitted by the deadline.
- Failure to meet the due date may result in **'Not Achieved'**.
- If there are special circumstances that means work cannot be submitted by the due date, an extension can be requested before the due date. A valid reason is needed to be granted an extension. (e.g. medical, bereavement, representing NZ; NOT an overseas holiday). Please note, for practical assessments and experiments, it may not always be possible for an extension to be granted. An Extension Application form is available from the subject Faculty Leader/Head of Department or the Deputy Principal (Ms Harris).

Breach of Assessment Rules

Breaking assessment rules and misconduct during an assessment is taken very seriously. Students are expected to follow written and verbal instructions.

A breach includes:

- Submitting another person's work and pretending it is your own (plagiarism) will not be tolerated. This includes copying another student's work, allowing someone to copy your work or copying from resource material without identifying the source.
- Communicating with someone else in any way during a test or exam.
- Inappropriate use of a mobile phone or device (this includes having the phone on their person and/or not switching them off).
- Taking notes and handouts into an exam.
- Students are expected to follow the assessment instructions – this includes written and verbal instructions issued as part of the assessment process.

The course of action if a breach is proven *could also* include some or all of the following:

A warning.

A result of **'Not Achieved'**.

Reported to NZQA.

Resubmitting the work under the HoDs or PN's supervision.

Information being passed on to the HoDs of other option classes.

Work in other parts of the subject re-evaluated.

Work in other subjects re-evaluated.

Staff will monitor the progress of student work to prove authenticity – attendance in class and meeting milestones are particularly important to enable authenticity to be verified. When handing in assessments a student will need to sign the Authenticity Section on the front of the coversheet.

- Any visitors to the school will contact reception via the keypad for entry.

SPORTS SCENE

Congratulations to our 5 ex-students who were competing or behind the scenes at the 2020 Tokyo Olympics.

Tyla Nathan-Wong won GOLD in Rugby 7s. Tyler was the youngest to ever be selected to the New Zealand women's sevens team when she made her debut as an 18-year-old in 2012 and in Y13 here at Lynfield. She was a key member of the team that lifted the sevens World Cup a year later. She is the second most capped New Zealand women's sevens player and was the second female to score 1000 World Series points.

Maddi Wesche performed outstandingly to finish 6th in the Shot Put, smashing her PB twice on the way. Prior to the Olympics her best throw was 18.32m. In the qualifying round she improved this by 18cm then in the finals pushed the shot out to 18.98m, which is a huge increase of 51cm on her pre-Olympic PB.

Katie Bowen was a member of the Football Ferns which had an enormous task in front of them after being drawn in by far the most difficult pool.

Eroni Leilua sailed for Samoa in the Men's One Person Dinghy – Laser competition finishing 32nd.

Dr Carl Bradford was a Sport Scientist with the NZ Women's Endurance Cycling team.

The points table is locked up with 2 houses 1st= and another 2.5 points behind in 3rd place, so the competition next week will be a very tough battle.
