Kia ora koutou

Thank you for everything that you are doing to support our learners in remaining engaged and connected with their learning. We have heard of some lovely stories about class activities being undertaken with photos. These included one synchronous English lesson being closed by a student performing a musical item!

COVID has changed our 'normal' in many ways including the payment of school fees and GP donation. Further to a 20% drop in families paying the GP donation in 2020, the BOT recognised the effect that COVID was having and signed up for the Government Donation scheme for 2021. This scheme provides \$150 for every student under the age of 19 (calculated from the school roll in July of the previous year). This is why you have not been invoiced for course costs this year nor has a voluntary GP donation been requested.

We were very relieved to hear today's announcement that Auckland will be moving to Alert Level 2 from 6am Sunday 7 March and that school will be open for all students from Monday 8 March. All students should go to form class at 8.45am. There will be no assemblies.



Summer Sports

Weekly summer sporting competitions began in Week 2 and now we have girls and boys cricket, dragon boating, tennis, as well as senior water polo and volleyball teams competing in weekly competitions. Covid L3 has meant we are still waiting for rock climbing and orienteering to get underway.

The 2021 summer season is under way with approximately 200 students competing (or soon to begin) in regular weekly interschool team competitions in tennis, cricket, dragon boating, orienteering, water polo and volleyball.

Cricket

A determined 1st XI Boys team proceed to the 1B top four

Playing Avondale in the final round of the round robin, the 1st XI won the toss and decided to bat. A half century from young gun Rishitt Walavalkar and a powerful 38 from Harman Reen, set a defendable total of 172. Despite being 5 for 55, Avondale College fought back hard and had the 1st XI on the back foot. A determined spell from Maanov Bali, and 5/39 from Rikhil Parmar meant the 1st XI got over the line by 38 runs. A valiant effort.

The 1st XI dominate the competition standings, with Kartik Banerjee being the leading wicket taker, with 21 wickets, and also the fifth highest scoring batsmen (255 runs), Rikhil Parmar is also the 4= most effective bowler, with 12 wickets, Urwah Afzal not far behind, with his 11 wickets from only 7 matches. Maanov Bali has also made a great impact to the 1st XI this term, taking 5 wickets so far in his first three games, at an economy of 2.91, impressive during the middle overs of the match.

The 1st XI are now only a few wins away from the 1B final, where they hope for their hard work to pay off in the hope of playing in the 1A competition come term four of this year.

Also Saturday the 27 February saw the unique opportunity for a Junior Lynfield vs Lynfield match, as both our Junior teams had a bye. Playing a 30 over format, Team 2 captained by Aryamaan Nannegari batted first, posting 126, with runs from Aryamaan (35 runs), Fareh Mubashar and Kishan Patel. In response, team one – captained by Shiv Patel, chased it down in 24 overs, with Shiv Patel making 42*, Ayush Swarnapuri 24, and Kailash 17 runs. The boys loved the opportunity to compete against each other and challenge themselves to play under the pressure of their peers.

The **2nd XI boys** team had a great win on Saturday 20 February against Sacred Heart 3rdXI. Batting first, we made 249, with Adil making 102. Then we bowled Sacred Heart out for 228 in the final over. Great death bowling by Huzaifa and Hassan.

Orienteering

This year we have 30 students from all year levels ready to start this competition which is held on the grounds of a different school each week. Each competes individually to find all the check points in the fastest possible time. The 1st competition day is next Monday hopefully.

Dragon Boating

With no experience needed, no trials and 21 in each boat, Dragon Boating has attracted 44 very committed students who have a 2 hour weekly training at Westhaven. They will compete in the Auckland Secondary Schools regatta on Lake Pupuke on March 14. This is a' full on' day with the 1st race at 8am and the last one about 4pm. After the fantastic fun the paddlers over the past 6 years, they are really looking forward to an awesome day!
