
20ED Tāwharanui Camp Class Report

Thursday the 16th of June saw 22 students and 3 teachers take part in the Level 2 Outdoor Education camp up in the Tāwharanui Regional Park. After a short lunch break in the Matakana township, the group continued north towards Tāwharanui Peninsula.

The focus was navigation and tramping. We broke into two groups for the navigation assessment and the walk around the peninsula. The walk consisted of wonderful views as we did map-to-ground navigation. The students were gifted an amazing leadership opportunity after the teachers decided we were trustworthy enough to navigate to the campsite. Halfway to the campsite we found the teachers in a bush enjoying the views of the peninsula and catching 40 winks.

We did a night navigation task to hear but not see kiwis, because we ended up being in the wrong spot and were further up the valley than we anticipated. We were able to wake up early to see the sunrise. In the morning we were tasked with completing a navigation assignment to locate landmarks and point them out in real life and on the map. We managed to get back early to have a swim.

We would like to thank the parents of the students who attended the camp for allowing this to be made possible and to Mrs Reynolds and Mr Smith for making sure we could actually have a camp. Also thanks to Mrs Wells for taking time away from her classes to join us for the two days we were away and to all the students who attended the camp for making it an absolutely great camping and tramping trip.

And what did the students have to say about acting in a Shakespeare play?

Dylen Motufoaki – I play Shylock who is often angry. I enjoyed playing a main character. The language was hard, but it was cool as. From being in a production I have discovered that there are people like me!

Kaitlyn Connell-Rowe - I play Portia who is rich and white. I enjoyed being able to walk angrily and gesticulate a lot.

Riya Patel – I play Nerissa who is a calm and thoughtful character who can also be sneaky. She isn't bossed around and has a mind of her own. Speaking Shakespearean lines is really odd but I can finally understand what they mean. I discovered that I am capable of performing really outlandish melodramatic actions.

PISA Testing


This year we are participating in the 3 yearly International PISA Tests.

PISA is the OECD's Programme for International Student Assessment. It measures 15-year-olds' ability to use their reading, mathematics and science knowledge and skills to meet real-life challenges. It is the largest comparative study of education in the world. Policymakers use PISA as an international benchmark for education performance and to make policy decisions.

Approximately 70 of our Year 11 students will take part in PISA on August 10. The students are randomly selected by the Ministry of Education, and we will notify parents/whanau, if their child has been selected to participate.

Te Reo Māori Class - Tikanga around Powhiri

For Te Reo Maori this week, our primary focus was learning and understanding the process and tikanga around powhiri. We watched a recently broadcasted show called Hongi to Hangi for one activity. After watching the show, we were asked to make an infographic that provides essential information that we thought someone unfamiliar with the process of powhiri would want to know. The infographic I designed shows what I thought was the most important information I learned and was most important to share. Please look at the infographic that I have designed.

Individual Sports Honours


Our students compete in a variety of sports and challenges! Congratulations to the following students for their recent notable success.
