Changes to NCEA Credits for 2022

This week the Associate Minister of Education announced changes to NCEA that recognise the impact that student and teacher absences due to COVID-19 and other winter illnesses have had on teaching, learning and assessment this year.

In 2022, students will be entitled to **1 Learning Recognition Credit (LRC) for every 5 credits** earned through assessment, up to a maximum of:

NCEA Level 1 - 10 LRC | NCEA Level 2 - 8 LRC | NCEA Level 3 - 8 LRC

To receive a Certificate Endorsement, students will need 46 credits at Merit or Excellence level, instead of the usual 50.

To be awarded University Entrance, students will need **14 credits in each of two UE Approved Subjects, and 12 credits in a third UE Approved Subject** (they will also need to attain NCEA Level 3 and meet the regular literacy and numeracy requirements).

The submission dates for some externally assessed portfolios have also been moved back one week.

A reminder our Term 3 Parent Student Teacher (PST) Conferences will be held on Thursday, August 18 (1.00 pm to 7.00 pm) and Tuesday, August 23 (1.00 pm to 7.00 pm).

Senior Reports

These will be on the parent portal on Tuesday 16 August, in time for our Parent-Student- (Hui mai) Teacher Conferences.

Parent-Student- (Hui mai) Teacher Conferences (PST)

An email was sent to parents / caregivers last Friday afternoon with information and booking instructions. The conferences will be held on Thursday 18 August (1.00 pm to 7.00 pm) and Tuesday 23 August (1.00 pm to 7.00 pm).

Bookings opened on Friday 5 August at 3.00 pm and close on Wednesday 17 August at 3.00 pm. They will reopen Friday 19 August at 9.00 am and close on Monday 22 August at 3.00 pm.

The focus of the PST meetings will be academic progress and course options. Students are expected to attend these conferences with you and lead the conversation.

The meetings can be either **face to face** or **online**. Your child's Hui mai teacher will ask which option you plan to use prior to the meeting.

Note: Students do not come to school on the days of the conferences unless they are attending a workshop or a PST conference.

PLEASE NOTE: SUBJECT TEACHERS

A reminder that should you wish to speak to a subject teacher about your child's progress in a specific subject area, please let the Hui mai teacher know via email or at the PST conference. The subject teacher will then contact you. Making a booking with a subject teacher is not possible at these PST conferences.

Senior Assessment Weeks 12 - 23 September

These 2 weeks of assessment are for practice external exams and some internal practical assessments. Year 12 and 13 students will be on study leave over these two weeks and only need to come to school for their exam/assessment. Year 11 students will be on normal class timetable and their practice exams / assessments will take place during class time. These may not be during week 8 and 9. There is no study leave for Year 11. Details and the timetable will be shared in a few weeks' time.

Digital Exams

Students in the following subjects and courses have been offered the choice of doing their practice external exam in September and their NZQA external exams on a digital platform.

Level 3: Chinese, Japanese, German, English (3ENG and 3ENW), Classical Studies, History, Media studies, Business Studies Level 2: English (2ENG, 2ENR, 2ENW, 2ENS), Classical Studies, History, Media Studies Level 1: History

Teachers in the above courses have been talking with their students about what this choice involves and are now preparing students who have made the choice to do their exam digitally. Students access the exams using their NSN learner login. They already use the student login to see their results, Record of Achievement, personal details or to apply for a review or reconsideration. Students doing the digital exams will need to create their account if they do not already have one, or they will need to login to check their information. Please remind your child to create/check their account, well before they do a digital exam. Information on how to create an account is available via Hui mai classes on Schoology. As a parent/caregiver you play an important part in this process along with your child's Hui mai teacher in ensuring students are selecting appropriate courses for their chosen pathways. Use your parent login and password. If you have forgotten it, click sign in with magic link. This will send you a login link to the email address you have registered with the school.

Nomination forms are available from the Returning Officer: Student Trustee Election, Mr Neil Waddington. His office is located on the Deans' Level, Adminstration Building.


Wā Hono: Innovation and Invention

This term's Wā hono is Innovation and Invention. Wā hono is where Year 9 and 10 students learn around a topic across the curriculum then connect their learning in a collaborative project.

From last term's Castaway project, students shared that they enjoyed the collaboration and the opportunity to be creative, so we are looking forward to building on these this term.

Assembly presentations have informed students about the purpose of Wā hono in building their readiness for life beyond school. The OECD Skills 2030 framework discusses four types of learning that are necessary to be successful. Opportunities such as Wā hono are where students can practise their interdisciplinary (making connections between areas) and epistemological learning (thinking like a practitioner). See image below

The Learning Outcomes for the Innovation and Invention topic will see students describe what it is to be innovative in each subject, see examples, and practise being innovative using different models.


NZ Engineering Science Competition 2022


The 2022 competition was held on Saturday, 6 August in school. The question was posted online at 10 am and students had to compile a comprehensive report and email it to the organisers by the 6 pm deadline. This annual competition is a problem solving event for teams of three to four secondary students, organised by the Department of Engineering Science at University of Auckland.

2022 Question: What is the largest payload that can be launched into space by Slingshot?

The question is meant to be open ended so to encourage critical thinking, use of a multitude of problems solving skills and mathematical modelling to support the teams' argument.

This year, we had 5 teams in total, consisting of students from years 11 - 13. The judges (comprised of Phd students and lecturers) at the university are now going through hundreds of reports and the results of the competition will be released early next term.





Talanoa and Hui Whānau Evening

On Thursday 4 August the Young Māori and Pacific Pride leaders hosted our first combined Hui Whānau/Talanoa here at Lynfield College for 2022.

These included Head Chef Mark Gillespie from Auckland's Botswana Butchery and our very own MasterChef New Zealand 2022 participant Dylan Fernandes (see photo below).

Into exciting and interactive sessions students prepared and tested mocktails with Dion and Puretu from the Crown Institute of Studies and learnt the skills involved in making Dylan Fernandes' signature dish, *Mushroom Filled Tortellini in a Creamy Broth with Prosciutto and Shard*. Our budding chefs then worked in groups to prepare and present their own versions of Botswana Butchery's *Lobster Cornets with Crayfish Mayonnaise* and *Beef Gyoza with Sake Broth and Black Vinegar Dressing* under Head Chef Mark Gillespie's watchful eye.

And if that wasn't enough, Chef Lecturer Craig Lucas from the Manukau Institute of Technology talked learning and career paths in an informative session, and then demonstrated the preparation and presentation of his favourite, dish of *Sous-vide Chicken served with Whipped Potato and Jus-lie*. This was followed by a great discussion with John Kelly from AUT, introducing a new course for 2023 - Global Tourism - which several of our students really connected with.

We are so proud of how our students interacted with our presenters and involved themselves in these amazing sessions. They did Lynfield College Proud!

Huge thanks to all of our presenters who have absolutely fired up our students and shown them what exciting career opportunities and learning pathways lay ahead of them.




Shinagawa Summer School - Virtual Kapa Haka

KBB Music Festival

The Lynfield College Chamber Orchestra and Big Band both competed at the KBB Music Festival this week, with the support of their teachers Mr Sue, and Mr Isdale. After a tricky start to the year it was fantastic to see these groups back on the stage, and representing the school!

The Chamber Orchestra Performed four songs, starting with 'Ahrirang' (a traditional Korean folk song), before moving to the Gavotte and Pizzicato from 'Simple Suite', excerpts from 'Eine Kleine Nachtmusik', and finishing with 'Tango Mariana'. A particularly beautiful performance of Ahrirang was the standout, being skilfully led by Daisy Chen (Y11) on First Violin, and it was very well received by the audience and adjudicators.

Lynfield Kā Hui Ako

The Lynfield Kāhui Ako (LKA) is a multicultural, diverse group of ten kura from Primary to Secondary and eleven ECE services, working as one and for the first time ever, we have Te Kaunihera o t Kāhui (a Kāhui ako student council!). Students representing 9 kura in the Lynfield Kāhui Ako (LKA): Blockhouse Bay Intermediate School, Blockhouse Bay Primary School, Chaucer School, Glenavon School, Hay Park School, Lynfield College, Marshall Laing School, New Winsor School and Waikowhai Intermediate School have met twice so far this year.

Our first hui focused on relationship building and identifying the purpose of Te Kaunihera o te Kāhui. Using the 'Action Learning Competence Learning Process' pictured, students identified that there was an issue: that students don't really know about what the LKA is, and not that many students are directly involved in LKA events. The Kaunihera students decided that they should step up to "spread the word." At our second hui, Kaunihera members started to brainstorm ideas for events they would like the LKA to be involved in, and then started to elaborate on their favourite ideas and what they would need to contribute to make such an event happen. 
