Music Update

Te Marama Puoro o Aotearoa — New Zealand Music Month has been in full swing at Lynfield College, with students writing, recording, performing and listening to music all over the place. This kicked off with 7 Entries in the Play it Strange Youthtown Songwriting competition, an original song contest for students in Years 9, 10 and 11. Finalists in this competition will get to spend a day recording their song in a professional recording studio, and have their song released on Spotify as part of the Youthtown Album. We will be eagerly awaiting the results, which are due at the end of the month.

Our Senior music students attended the annual Auckland Philharmonic Orchestra's Discovery concert, where all of the music was based around the concept of journeys. The programme featured some classics like *In the Hall of the Mountain King* by Edvard Greig and the *Orpheus Overture* by Offenbach. However, it was the two distinctly New Zealand songs that really stood out. *Tupaia*, a complexly delicate piece by New Zealand composer Salina Fisher, featured Māori percussion instruments and haunting strings depicting the journey of Tupaia over the pacific on the way to the shores of Aotearoa. Alongside this was the premiere of Liam Pram's Piece Regarding Human Beings Like Roses. It was a confronting piece, reflecting the isolation over the last two years, and how we often turn to digital technologies as a source of escapism. Both of these pieces captivated our students and were a fantastic reminder of the power of live music.

Congratulations to past-pupil Floyd Tunnell (Sports Captain 2021) who has now become a qualified Firefighter for the Titirangi Volunteer Fire Brigade. Floyd passed in his unqualified red helmet for the qualified yellow helmet with single stripe and new epaulettes.

Qualified firefighter training includes attending multiple training sessions over several months at the brigade itself, a study of theory books, a two-day first aid course and a gruelling one week training session in Mt Wellington, Auckland where their knowledge, suitability and fitness for the role is tested.

The activities they must pass to qualify cover:

Search and rescue, live fire training, hose work, observation and reporting, forestry and vegetation fire management and the hardest part - managing breathing apparatus under simulated fire in a confined space in the dark.



Literacy and Numeracy Pilot

This week a letter has been emailed to parents and caregivers of Year 10 students who will be sitting the Literacy and Numeracy Pilot Assessments between 28 - 30 June.

The new Literacy and Numeracy standards will help ensure that students have the foundational skills to support them in further studies, work, and life. The standards will become a mandatory part of NCEA in 2023.

Students have been informed by their English and Maths teachers if they are entered for these assessments and over the coming weeks will have the opportunity to become familiar with sample assessment questions.

Parent / Student / Teacher Conferences

Despite having to work under Covid restrictions last term, we still managed to successfully hold our Parent Student Teacher Conferences, albeit on Google Meet. Thank you for taking the time to complete our survey last term. Overall, the feedback we received, indicated it was a positive experience for the majority of those who participated.

For many years, the attendance data for conferences was on average under 30%. In March this year, we almost doubled this attendance despite the challenges of online and Covid! We will continue with three-way conferences with the Hui mai mentor in the next meetings in August.

Many of you told us you liked having an online option, so we will offer online AND face to face meetings in August.

We will continue to work on building stronger communication with our families in terms of sharing achievement information. Please remember the Parent Portal is live (it has academic achievement, punctuality, and attendance information). Conversations with subject teachers can be arranged if you have concerns over your child's academic progress. The aim is always to have no surprises in August, no matter what system we use. Pastoral concerns should go through your child's Hui mai teachers and Deans. Your child's Hui mai teacher is the first port of call and they can guide you as to how you can contact other teachers.

Term 3 PSTs will be held 18 and 23 August. We look forward to meeting with as many of you as possible. The focus for Term 3 PSTs will be option choices and achievement progress.

Student-led Tutoring

The Academic Council is offering a **lunchtime** student-led study support system in the Seminar Room, for all year levels, starting from this week. This will run every week for the remainder of the year, and closer to exam time there will be additional sessions for help with studying. This study system will run three days a week, and has been grouped into three main categories:

Tuesday - Maths

Wednesday - English

Thursday - Science

We encourage anyone needing extra help or support with their work to come along! There will be a range of senior students available to help, as well as teachers available for Maths.


