

# 2BIO Field Trip to Smith's Bush

The level 2 Biology Field trips were a success this year. Unfortunately, due to significant damage to the roads during the severe weather we had earlier this year, Arataki visitors centre and forest was inaccessible for our usual field trip. This year we attended a new site in Northcote, Smith's Bush. Smith's Bush is a preserved section of native forest located in Auckland's North Shore. Here the students sample biotic and abiotic data in order to identify a community pattern. The trip also gave the students the opportunity to work across biology classes and learn about local flora.



# Learning German Through Hip Hop

The German language classes across all year levels had the great opportunity to work with Anjay (Andreas Chetkowski) a hip hop/ rap artist from Berlin. Anjay presented some of his songs to the students with some additional freestyle elements. Some students explored how to create beats and sounds using a range of German sounds (Pizza, Katze etc). Others learned to write and sing their own short rap verse with 16 bars in length, using spoken German words as well as focusing on flow. # Greek Vase Painting Workshop

This week all Year 13 Classical Studies classes had a workshop with Pottery maker Ashleigh Annereau, to practice decorating terracotta with a selection of the ancient Greek vase paintings that they had been learning about this term.

After discussing the ways that the Greeks harvested, purified and prepared their clay, Ashleigh covered the technique of Black Figure vase painting. Each student was given their already prepared piece of clay to paint on. They transferred their original Greek design on to their terracotta using the sketch that they prepared the week before in class. They covered the silhouette of their figures with black slip, and incised the intricate details. We all finished the day with a bit more appreciation for the skills of the Greek potters and our own piece of 'Ancient Greece'.

# Parent Student Teacher Conferences

Our first round of Parent, Student, Teacher Conferences (PSTs) for 2023 were held on Thursday 30 March and Tuesday 4 April. Our students were able to describe their short- and long-term goals for the year and reflect on what is going well and not so well in their subject classes. Hui mai teachers also shared progress information from subject teachers.

We continue to offer both face to face or online options to enable whānau to choose what best suits their situation. We enjoyed connecting with our whānau and listening to our young people discuss their learning.

A reminder: If you have a concern about your child's progress in a specific subject area, you can still let your child's Hui mai teacher know via email and they will ask the subject teacher to phone you.

## Student Access to the College Grounds

With the construction work that is happening on the school grounds there have been had to be some changes made to how students enter and exit the school grounds. Entry is via Gates 1 and 3 and the Kimberhall Pedestrian Gate from 7.00am until 9.00am. After 9.00am entry and exit is through Gate 1 only. Students signing out during the day or Year 13s leaving when their last timetabled block for the day is a study must exit through Gate 1. Gates 1,2,3 and the Kimberhall Pedestrian Gate will be open for students to exit from 3.10pm
