Lynfield College at KBB Music Festival


Lynfield College once again had three groups in the KBB Music Festival held at Holy Trinity Cathedral last week. We started on Tuesday with the Chamber Orchestra conducted by Mr Sue, playing four great pieces of music. The highlight of the set was *Lijiang River Landscape*, a sweeping piece envoking the imagery and serenity of the countryside along the Lijiang River. The Chamber Orchestra section is notoriously tough, and coming away with **Bronze** was a fantastic result.


NZ Engineering Competition 2024

The 2024 competition was held on Saturday, 10 August in E block at school. The question was posted online at 10.00am and students had to compile a comprehensive report and email it to the organisers by the 6.00pm deadline. This annual competition is a problem-solving event for teams of three to four secondary students, organised by the Department of Engineering Science at University of Auckland. This year, there were a total of 284 teams participating.

2024 Question: How many airships would be required to replace the Cook Strait Ferries?

The question is meant to be open ended so to encourage critical thinking, use of a multitude of problems solving skills and mathematical modelling to support the teams' argument.

This year, we had 6 teams in total, consisting of students from years 11 - 12. The judges (comprised of PhD students and professors) at the university are now going through hundreds of reports and the results of the competition would be released early next term. The level of enthusiasm and eagerness to come up with a solution to the open-ended question was maintained as in the previous years.













10IL Women in Technology

As part of the Sustainability theme for Term 3, 10IL had a visit from the Women in Technology group. During this session, they worked collaboratively to design a pressure system, with the aim of filling all three tanks at the same rate. They used geometry and 3D objects to calculate and build the pressure system.





Innovative Learning Programme



RETURNS POLICY


We require a purchase receipt and tags to still be in garments to process returns. Please be aware that we can only return items up to 90 days from the date on your receipt.
