Volleyball

This year our Senior Boys Volleyball team travelled down to Palmerston North to compete in the New Zealand Secondary School Volleyball Nationals Competition. Unfortunately, due to their seedings, our Senior Boys were 1 spot off the Div 3-6 entry but still had a tough road ahead of them. Coming out of pool play, the boys were undefeated and lost only 1 set in 4 games which put them in a great position for the rest of the week. On Wednesday the boys played 2 games against Wellington High School in the morning and then Aotea College in the afternoon. They won the first game in 2 sets 25-21 for both but unfortunately went down to Aotea 17-25 and 23-25, however this still kept them in contention where they faced Whitby Collegiate in the quarter finals. This was an incredibly tough match and was very close for all 3 sets played, ending in a 25-23, 24-26 and 15-13 loss.



Meaning our boys once again played Aotea in a rematch, this game went a bit better for Lynfield losing the first set 14-25 and winning the second 25-15, however Aotea hung on and had a little bit more energy to narrowly win the final set 15-12. Friday was finals day and our team was facing local rivals Onehunga High school for 7th and 8th place. We once again went down in the first set 20-25 but brought it back in the second 25-21 where we then went on to unfortunately fall short in the final set losing 11-15. Despite the result being a bit disappointing, we are still proud of the boys for how they performed over the week and put their all into all their games. A couple thank you's to go out, firstly for Carmen Hansel who coached the boys throughout the season and while down at tournament. Her guidance and knowledge was pivotal in helping our boys learn and improve throughout the season. A massive thank you to Peter Jamieson. SUMMER SPORTS

Cricket 1st XI Girls

For the first time, Lynfield College 1st XI Girls Team was able to compete in the Div 2 Auckland Secondary Schools Cricket Tournament held at Lloyd Elsmore Park. They started off in a pool of 4 where they faced Diocesan 1st XI on Tuesday morning. Lynfield batted first and set a target of 117, not a huge score but still a defendable target. Diocesan then went out to chase the target and it was getting incredibly close with a few overs remaining. With 2 overs left, Diocesan were 3/102 so were needing 16 runs to win the game. Despite a wicket being taken in the 19th over, Dio were able to earn 9 runs and needed 7 off the final over which they unfortunately managed to track down with only 2 balls remaining. The girls were extremely disappointed with this result but didn't have long of a turn around before their game with Macleans College. This was yet again an extremely closely fought match. Macleans made 131 runs for 4 wickets but our girls were determined to win this game and stay in contention for the top spots at the tournament. They had an awesome fight back and needed 2 runs off the final over. This time however, we came away on the positive side of it winning with 2 balls remaining! This was a highlight of our tournament and a nice reunion with their previous coach Swatna Lal. Their final pool play game was against Selwyn who had been undefeated so far. Despite Selwyn reaching 146 runs, our girls bowled really well but unfortunately fell short with 119 runs. Next up was Mt Roskill in the 5th-8th place semi finals, always a great time for a local rivalry. The solid target of 114 runs proved to be a bit too much for Mt Roskill to handle as our bowling held them down to 60 runs in the 20 overs. This meant that our girls would be playing in the 5th and 6th match against St Mary's. The Lynfield Girls set a great target of 138 which proved to be far too much for St Mary's to handle, getting all out for 51 runs. Congratulations to Tanvi Rana on taking a 5 wicket haul in that match and congratulations to the team and staff for their performances and contributions across the season!

Cricket 1st XI Boys

World Autism Awareness Month

April is Autism Awareness month. The Māori word for autism is beautifully expressed by the word takiwatanga, meaning 'in his/her/their own time and space'.

Autism is a neurodevelopmental condition that affects approximately 1 in 54 people, according to Autism NZ. The traits associated with autism span a wide spectrum and lead to a different way of seeing the world and interacting with others. Autism New Zealand (*www.autismnz.org.nz*) has delivered many educational programmes to increase public understanding of autism. It is a place where autistic people, their whanau and those who make up their support network, can learn about autism and also find the supports and services they would like to access.

The United Nations General Assembly declared 2 April as World Autism Awareness Day to highlight the need to help improve the quality of life for those with autism.

Altogether Autism (<u>www.altogetherautism.org,nz</u>) is another organisation where knowledge and support can be accessed. Parents of autistic students can also find support through Disability Connect <u>www.disabilityconnect.org.nz</u>. Their Monday night parent zoom sessions (between 7pm and 8 pm) can provide support for parents who need to connect with others.
