Riding Electric Scooters to and from School

A reminder to students riding E-scooters to and from school. The Land Transport (Road User) Rule 2004 outlines how riders must behave, including being 'careful and considerate' when riding on the road and footpath, not going too fast, and giving way to pedestrians. E-scooters can be used on footpaths and roads (as near as possible to the edge), but not in cycle lanes. Safe scooter riding in New Zealand involves being a considerate road user, obeying traffic rules, and taking precautions like wearing a helmet. A reminder for students and the community about safe driving, obeying the speed limit, and especially for the students ensuring they are adhering to the rules of their individual licence.

2025 China Exchange

Twenty-three students from Years 10 to 13 spent their holidays travelling to China on a cultural exchange trip, marking our first visit in seven years to our sister school, Greentown School in Hangzhou. The trip offered students an incredible opportunity to experience Chinese culture firsthand while reconnecting with our long-standing friends in Hangzhou. Highlights included visits to iconic landmarks such as the Great Wall of China, the Forbidden City in Beijing, the Bund and Zhujiajiao Water Town in Shanghai, and the scenic West Lake in Hangzhou. Students also enjoyed spectacular performances, including the Impression West Lake show, staged entirely on water, and the action-packed Romance of the Song Dynasty.

The group experienced modern wonders like climbing the world's third tallest building and spending a magical day at Disneyland. Food was also a popular part of the journey, from tasting Peking Duck and dumplings to one brave student even trying a locust! The highlight for many was staying with their homestay families in Hangzhou, where they experienced everyday Chinese life and hospitality. Our students represented Lynfield College with pride, earning praise from hosts, guides, and drivers alike. We are incredibly grateful to Greentown School for their warm welcome and look forward to hosting them when they visit in Term 3.

Special thanks must go to Ms Fang for all her work not only in organising the trip, but also for being the expert translator, tour guide and travel agent while we were there. Her skills and efforts are much appreciated.

















ANZAC Day

This year we were honoured to sing the National Anthems of Aotearoa and Australia for the ANZAC Day dawn ceremony. Singing alongside Opera singer Te Ohorere Williams, the service was held at the Auckland War Memorial Museum in front of 20,000 people and broadcast live on Whakaata Māori TV. After a full day of rehearsal on Thursday, the 14 students arrived at Lynfield College at 4am on Friday morning, for their 4.30am call time at the domain. They performed brilliantly, with a lot of people commenting on how good they sounded. The service is available to view online HERE from the 56minute mark.

A group of our executive students attended the May Road Anzac Day Service to pay their respects and honour the sacrifices made by those who served. As part of the ceremony, our Head Boy, John Mahe, proudly represented our school by delivering a heartfelt reading. It was a moving and respectful occasion, and we are very proud of all who participated. It was a privilege to stand alongside members of our community in remembrance.







Noah Pin (Year 13) was invited to play The Last Post and Reveille on Lynfield College's 1918 bugle at the ANZAC Service held at the Lynfield Murray Halberg Village for residents and whanau, who gathered to honour and remember the soldiers who fought for our country.

A particularly moving part of the service was listening to Lyn Dancer read her Grandfather's diary entry from 25 April 1915. Noah was also on standby in case he was needed to play the bugle for the Titirangi ANZAC Service.



Tauranga Jazz Festival

Five Jazz Combos made the trip to Tauranga in the last week of Term 1 to compete in the National Youth Jazz Festival. With a tight turn around to get their performances ready, we were really happy with the performances from all five groups. 11 Japanese Students Experience Traditional Bonseki

On Tuesday 8th April, our Year 11 Japanese language students had the unique opportunity to participate in a Bonseki workshop. Bonseki is a traditional Japanese art form that involves creating delicate miniature landscapes using white sand, pebbles, and small tools on black trays.

Students explored the rich history and cultural significance of Bonseki, guided by Naoko Sensei, a skilled Bonseki artist. They observed her demonstration of this intricate craft and then had the chance to create their own Bonseki scenes under her expert instruction.

One of the most fascinating aspects the students discovered is that Bonseki scenes are traditionally intended to be temporary, reflecting the Japanese aesthetic concept of impermanence. However, in some cases, artists use special techniques to preserve their creations. These preserved pieces are known as bonga (tray picture) or suna-e (sand picture).

Through this hands-on experience, students gained a deeper appreciation for Japanese culture and the beauty found in fleeting moments. We are incredibly grateful to Naoko Sensei for sharing her artistry and hope to welcome her back to our school again.

10TMS TearFund Sustainability Trip


Students had a fantastic time learning about material decomposition exploring examples of clothing and then a practical workshop on flower pressing with fabric. The results were quite beautiful with these samples needing to be set first week back next term. The second session focused on linear and circular fashion with students demonstrating their understanding of the waste model and alternatives to disposal through dramatic performance.

We were then treated to a tour of the transfer centre and where all the rubbish is sorted. It was a great day of learning, and we look forward to seeing the students' creativity in the Up-cycling project in Term 2.



30ED Karangahake Gorge Camp

In the last week of Term 1, both Level 3 Outdoor Education classes went on their long-awaited camp in the Karangahake Gorge. The focus for this camp was river safety and spending a night out in a survival shelter, better known as a bivi. We spent the camp learning, building, and developing our outdoor skills while spending time with the environment that encompassed us. Each day had its own list of activities, experiences, and assessments. Our group spent the first night in the bush, making a survival shelter from the environment around us. While we were lucky enough to have mostly calm and still weather throughout the week, there were a couple of times the weather took a turn, bringing wind and rain, but this definitely didn't stop anyone from making new memories. Some highlights from the camp were the white water rafting at Wero, as well as walking around the Karangahake Gorge. We all developed stronger bonds with one another, making new friends and learning more about each other. A big thank you to Ms Reynolds for planning this camp, as well as Mr Tahu and Ms Samson for helping us through this first OED camp and sacrificing your time.



Year 9 Innovative Learning Newsletter

Just before the Term 1 holidays, 9IL was challenged by a few of their teachers to do a cross-curricular project. This covered: Social Studies, Science, Mathematics, and PE and Health. Each of these parts of the project all combined to form the Turangawaewae project. Everyone made a Waka Hauora (Double Hulled Waka) for Social studies! It was made out of any material that we could source ourselves, however we also had to label each part of the waka and explain how waka were significant for historical Māori migration. The end results were absolutely amazing!

For the PE side of the project we had to identify which of the pillars in Te Whare Tapa Wha was the same as migrating on a waka. These include: Physical Wellbeing, Emotional Wellbeing, Mental Wellbeing and Social Wellbeing. We found it a great challenge to think about which pillar our wakas correspond with!

In Mathematics we had to write about another class member's Turangawaewae and find similarities to our own Turangawaewae. We also had to write a story about how we or our ancestors migrated. For the second part of the project, we got a world map and drew the coordinates, bearings, compass directions, speed of transport, and etc of our ancestors migration path! This was the most challenging part of our Turangawaewae project!

For science we linked back to our term one focus which was adaptation. We had to make a presentation about an organism native to our home country and talk about the why or why it would not survive if it migrated to NZ. We also had to define the characteristics, behaviour and adaptations of our chosen animal!

Overall, we really enjoyed this project as it allowed us to connect with ourselves, our peers and the environment we live in, as well as finding connections between the four different subjects this project was based on.

Information for Parents, Guardians and Whānau

It is important that we encourage students into a lifetime habit of donating blood and making a worthwhile contribution to their community.

The Care of Children Act 2004 allows people 16 years and over to make their own decisions about whether or not they wish to give blood. Students may choose to donate blood at this session.

NZBS recommends that students discuss becoming a blood donor with their family. If families have a particular objection to the student choosing to donate blood, please make this known to the student and to the school before the blood drive date stated above. More information about blood donation will be available on the day of the blood drive.

Parents are also welcome to come to the school and donate blood at this blood drive.

NZBS respects the privacy of all donors and recommends conversations around blood donor eligibility is carried out sensitively. If you require any further information please call 0800 GIVE BLOOD (0800 448 325) or visit nzblood.co.nz

Becoming a blood donor...

Age: First-time donors – 16 to 70 years of age | Existing donors – up to 80 years of age, subject to approval

Height /Weight: Weigh at least 50kg. First-time donors under 25 years of age must also meet the height and weight criteria. Use our handy calculator on our website at www.nzblood.co.nz to find out if you can donate.

Health: You must be in good health. You cannot donate if you have a cold, flu, sore throat, cold sore, stomach bug or any other infection.

You must wait 3 months following a tattoo or piercing before you can donate. If a piercing was performed by a registered health professional (GP, pharmacist, etc) you may be eligible to donate after 12 hours.

If you have recently visited the dentist, you must wait at least 24 hours following a minor procedure (cleaning, fillings or braces) or until you have recovered before donating. For complex procedures, such as tooth extraction, please wait at least 7 days after your procedure and any antibiotic treatment.

Travel: If you have been overseas recently, please refer to the 'Donating after Travelling' tool available at www.nzblood.co.nz to find out when you can donate.

Food: You must have eaten some food during the four hours prior to donation.

Identification: You need to bring suitable identification with you. Examples of acceptable ID are driver's licence, birth certificate or passport. A Student ID Card is acceptable if it features full name, date of birth and a photograph.

With your consent we may also ask the school to confirm you are at least 16 years of age.

Important facts about blood:

There is no substitute for human blood; healthy donors are the only source of our blood supply.

Around 30,000 patients are treated with blood or blood products in New Zealand each year.

A blood donation is separated into different components, each of which is used to treat different patients (accident trauma, patients undergoing surgery, people with leukaemia, transplant patients and many others).

Blood products are also used for immunisation to help prevent diseases such as hepatitis A and B, tetanus and chickenpox.

Each donation can help save up to 3 people - blood donors are literally lifesavers!

Uniform & Stationery Shop

HOURS

The Uniform and Stationery shop is open to all students on site for their uniform and stationery needs during interval and lunchtime Mondays to Thursdays, and on Fridays before school at 8am and interval.

We are not open on Saturday and Sunday, Teacher Only Days or the between term holidays.

Parents can attend the shop at the following times:

Monday - Thursday 10.00am - 12.00pm and 12.30pm - 1.30pm

Friday 8.00am – 11.30am

SECOND HAND CLOTHING

The Uniform and Stationery Shop also sells second hand items. We ask that if you wish to purchase the second hand items, you do not come during student's morning tea or lunchtimes.

Please be aware that we do not have the full size range in the second hand items. Proceeds from secondhand uniform sales go to our hardship fund to support students in need.

LYNFIELD COLLEGE BLAZER

The Lynfield College blazer is available to all students. The cost is \$260 and it can be purchased from the Uniform Shop. We only have a few available in each size at the moment, but if we have high demand, more stock can be brought in.

ONLINE ORDERING

Online ordering is available through our website https://lynfield.school.nz/shop.html. Payment can be made by direct credit or credit card and students onsite are able to collect the items from the shop during the above times. Orders are usually ready the next day.

RETURNS POLICY

We require a purchase receipt, tags and the skirt "runner stitch" to still be in garments to process returns. Please be aware that we can only return items up to 90 days from the date on your receipt.

LOST PROPERTY

If your child has lost uniform items, please ask them to check the Lost Property bin outside the uniform shop.

WATERCARE - HUIA 1 PIPELINE WORKS, BLOCKHOUSE BAY AREA UPDATE

These works, including our final connection works, will be finished by late May/early June 2025.

Heaphy Street connection works

We will be doing our final connection works on Heaphy Street on **30 April 2025**. Once we do our final connection works, we will need to carry out our final reinstatement works which are estimated to take a further two weeks. Traffic management will remain in place as per its current setup.

White Swan Road connection works

We will also be doing our final connection works at 209-213 White Swan Road on **14 May 2025**. Once we do our final connection works, we will need to carry out our final reinstatement works which are estimated to take a further two weeks. Traffic management will remain in place as per its current setup.

We realise that these works have been long and disruptive, and we would like to thank the community for their patience while we have undertaken this important section of works.
