One of his favourite moments was looking through the Honours Boards in the Hall and spotting the names of old friends and familiar faces from his time at Lynfield.

After leaving school, Colin and his brother founded a successful plumbing business in Orewa, where he still lives today. He spoke passionately about how Lynfield College gave him a strong foundation helped shape the person he became. Over the school holidays, a number of our students took part in short courses to explore potential career pathways and gain some real life experience.

Four students — Liam Stuart, Seamus Mohally-Sheehan, Charlie Harris, and Galaxy Karepa-Ross — attended an Adventure Short Course run by the International Travel College of New Zealand. The programme gave them the chance to connect with professionals in the adventure tourism industry and learn about the responsibilities, safety standards, and teamwork involved in this field. The highlight of the course was the chance to complete the Auckland Harbour Bridge climb, followed by a bungee jump — a nerve-racking yet exhilarating experience for some of them! All four students successfully completed the course, developing confidence and practical insight into adventure tourism as a career option.

In addition, several other Year 12 and 13 students also completed a two-day Customer Service and Communications course at the same College. This experience provided valuable knowledge and practical skills that will serve them well in both employment and tertiary study. Students also earned up to seven Level 3 NCEA credits through their participation.


The visit was a massive success with students thoroughly enjoying the experience. We hope that this will be something that could happen again in the future!

Derived Grades: Where a student faces extenuating circumstances and is not able to sit their NCEA external examinations, a derived grade can be applied for using this link <u>Download a derived grade application form [PDF, 121 KB]</u> or collect an application form from the school office. Students need to provide supporting documents that show why, for circumstances beyond their control, they: couldn't attend an external examination or submitted an incomplete externally assessed portfolio. Derived grade applications are due no more than 2 weeks after the student's last affected exam or assessment. All Derived Grades are only provisional. They are confirmed by NZQA in January when results are released.

Individual Sports Honours

RAJAL SHARMA YEAR 12

Rajal proudly represented New Zealand at the 2025 Trans-Tasman Challenge, held in Christchurch from 25–30 September. Across four challenging days, 76 archers from Australia and New Zealand faced unpredictable weather, pressure-filled shoot-offs, and strong opponents in pursuit of the Trans-Tasman Cup.

In the end, Australia narrowly claimed victory with 124 points, while New Zealand followed closely with 119 in a tightly contested tournament.

Competing in his first international event, Rajal delivered one of his best archery performances. In the World Archery Ranking Round, he scored 667 out of 720 points, earning a well-deserved place on the podium with a **silver medal** in the Compound Under 18 Men division. He continued giving his best in Matchplay, even setting a new **personal best (PB)** with an impressive score of 144/150.

This tournament marks a significant milestone for Rajal—gaining invaluable experience, forging new friendships, and wearing the silver fern with great pride.
