I have been speaking in assemblies this week about our Korowai value, *Whanaungatanga tika - we are connected*.

One of the best ways our students can be connected with what is happening at the school is through being aware of the events and activities running and opportunities offered. These are shared with the students through our **notices**. Students who start up their device in the morning will see these automatically displayed when they login. During the day notices can be accessed through SchoolBridge.

As a good habit for learning, we recommend that students shut down their device each night and charge it fully ready for use the following day. We are also reminding them to put their device into 'sleep' mode should their device be left unattended.


## Year 9 Innovative Learning Newsletter

9IL has been studying Mathematics in preparation for the upcoming e-asTTle test. In Science they recently explored adaptations to understand how different animals adjust to various environments. As part of their learning, they visited the lab K3 to experiment with dry ice. Students observed sublimation where solid carbon dioxide turns directly into gas creating fog-like clouds. They also investigated how dry ice reacts with water and indicators to demonstrate changes in acidity, making for an exciting hands-on experience.

In ILP/ILH, students have been learning about Te Whare Tapa Whā and exploring migration. Understanding why people migrate, whether due to economic opportunities, environmental changes, conflicts, or cultural connections helps students develop empathy and a broader perspective on global movement and history.

In ILT/ILE, students have been working on their Sugar Skull soft materials project, where they are learning how to sew. This skill is essential in Technology, as it builds fine motor skills, problem-solving abilities and creativity while helping students understand how textiles and construction methods impact design. They also explored storytelling through music by learning about ballads, writing their own based on a character from *Coco*. To bring the Mexican theme to life, they even made delicious Mexican nachos!

In PE, the focus has been on sports from different countries, broadening students' knowledge of global physical activities.

The Uniform and Stationery Shop also sells second hand items. We ask that if you wish to purchase the second hand items, you do not come during student's morning tea or lunchtimes.

Please be aware that we do not have the full size range in the second hand items. Proceeds from secondhand uniform sales go to our hardship fund to support students in need.

### LYNFIELD COLLEGE BLAZER
