We firmly believe that learning occurs all around us, extending far beyond the four walls of the classroom and the guidance of the classroom teacher. Over these last couple of weeks, our students have been exposed to a wealth of different, enriching experiences designed specifically to complement and deepen their in-class learning. For example, several classes participated in various field trips, including educational excursions to Rangitoto, Muriwai Beach, and Tāwharanui. Furthermore, we were privileged to host a dynamic session where a group of the original Polynesian Panthers spoke with our Year 11 History students, providing invaluable first-hand accounts that brought their curriculum to life. Our Barista and Business Studies students also had the opportunity to be interviewed on Radio New Zealand, giving them real-world media exposure. These authentic, hands-on experiences are precisely what makes learning engaging and relevant for our young people.

In terms of academic assessment, all Year 9 and 10 students have recently participated in the nationwide implementation of the SMART testing initiative over these last few weeks. This comprehensive assessment covers Reading, Writing, and Maths. As many of you know, this is the new standardised assessment tool being implemented across the country by the Ministry of Education, and its results will be instrumental in gathering robust national statistics on student achievement and progress.

Finally, a highlight of the past fortnight was the special event hosted on Friday 22<sup>nd</sup> May, where we welcomed a delegation of ex-students who attended the College between 1959 and 1966. It proved to be a truly fantastic and heartwarming day. We were honoured to listen to fascinating stories from their time at school, which helped us collate more essential history for the Lynfield College archives. A huge thank you is due to our student leaders who were fantastic hosts throughout the day. We also extend our special thanks to our kapa haka roopu for their stirring performance and our hospitality class for their great support in catering and organising the event, ensuring its smooth and successful execution.

## Alumni News

### LYNFIELD COLLEGE WELCOMES BACK ALUMNI FROM 1959–1966

Last Friday, we had the privilege of welcoming back 14 former students who attended Lynfield College between 1959 and 1966. It was a very special day filled with stories, memories, and meaningful connections between past and present generations of Lynfield College.

The day began with a meet and greet in the Hall, where our student leaders welcomed the alumni and spent time showing them some of the honours boards. Many enjoyed spotting familiar names, classmates, and memories from their time at Lynfield College.



The group was then formally welcomed by our Kapa Haka group with a heartfelt pōwhiri. Larry Moore spoke on behalf of the group and said how moving and special the welcome was, and how much it meant to be welcomed 'home' in such a meaningful way.

Following the pōwhiri, students and alumni spent time together over coffee and biscuits where Ms Knell shared a brief history of Lynfield College since the alumni left in 1966. The old photographs and stories from the school archives highlighted how much both the school and wider community have changed over the years.

Our students then guided the alumni on a tour of the school grounds where the group was amazed by the many modern developments, particularly the new C Block. Afterwards, they enjoyed a wonderful high tea prepared by our outstanding Hospitality team alongside Ms Van Niekerk.



The final part of the day took place in the staffroom, where alumni and students explored old photographs, yearbooks, and pieces of Lynfield College history from our archives. One of the biggest highlights for students was discovering an old detention book and reading some of the reasons students received detentions many years ago! There was also plenty of laughter while looking through old school uniforms and comparing them to today's styles. Several alumni also brought along their own yearbooks and photographs to share, which students thoroughly enjoyed seeing, giving a fascinating insight into what life at Lynfield College was like more than 60 years ago.

It was especially meaningful hearing about the contributions many of the alumni had given to Lynfield since leaving school. Grant Chester enjoyed revisiting the Lower Gym, which he and a group of others had helped fundraise equipment for, nearly 30 years ago. David Ashby was able to see the sundial in the Hall courtyard that he had personally made and installed, still standing proudly in its original place today.





Larry reflected that for many of them, success came after school rather than always during it. He shared a humorous story about how Sir Ralph Norris was reportedly denied a reference by then Principal, Des Thurston, when leaving school, yet later went on to become CEO of the Commonwealth Bank and was eventually knighted. He also reflected on how different life is for young people today, noting that in their generation many students could leave school and walk straight into a job, whereas today's students have a much more challenging and competitive time.

The alumni were overwhelming in their praise of our students, commenting on how respectful, engaging, and impressive they were. Equally, our students thoroughly enjoyed spending time with the alumni and hearing their stories and experiences.

It was a genuine privilege to welcome our alumni back to Lynfield College. We sincerely thank them for spending the day with us and sharing such an important part of our school's history.

## Mana Ora Youth Resilience Programme

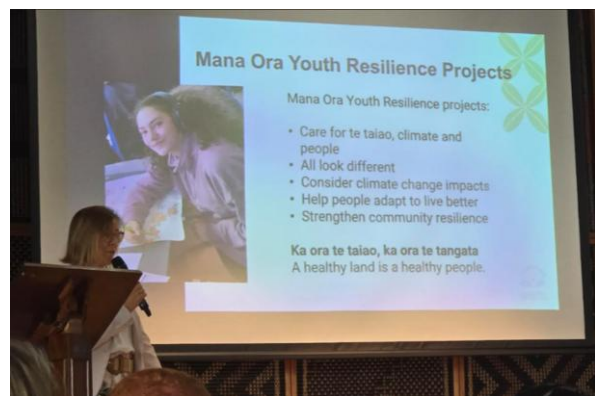

## Year 13 Business Group on RNZ National with Lisa Owens

On Monday 26 May, our Year 13 Business Studies group *Safe and Sound* was interviewed by Lisa Owens on RNZ National to talk about our self-defence alarm keychains (see link below). Nabeeha Kamran represented our team live on air, explaining how our product works and why we created it, while team members Amisha Kalyan, Tehillah Hubert, and Ella Harrington supported from school.



During the interview, Nabeeha spoke about the safety concerns that inspired our business. In Auckland, 82% of young women have experienced sexual harassment in public places, and 75% have been followed by a stranger. Hearing statistics like these made us want to design a safety tool that is simple, affordable, and effective for everyday use. Our self-defence alarm keychains are small, loud, and easy to carry, offering reassurance in moments when people may feel vulnerable.

We also shared with RNZ how we wanted our keychains to be both functional and appealing to younger audiences. By creating customisable, and aesthetically pleasing designs, we hope to make personal safety feel more normal, approachable, and discreet for young people.

Being featured on RNZ was an amazing opportunity to spread awareness about our mission and highlight the importance of safety in our community. Through this project, we've strengthened our teamwork, communication, and entrepreneurial skills while working toward a product that can make a real difference.

## ***2OED Tāwharanui Camp***

Last week, the Year 12 Outdoor Education classes completed their first practical assessments during a camp at the stunning Tāwharanui Peninsula in perfect weather. The camps were split into two groups, with one camp running from Monday to Wednesday and the second from Wednesday to Friday.

Throughout the week, students developed their outdoor skills, teamwork and resilience while immersed in the natural environment. Each day provided new challenges and experiences; pitching tents, cooking their food on camping cookers, completing navigation exercises, swimming at the beach and looking for kiwi in the evening.

On the second day, students tackled the 13km hike across the rolling hills of Tāwharanui, putting both their navigation and teamwork skills to the test. The camps concluded with a final navigation assessment on the last morning before packing up and returning to school.

Some of the highlights from the camps included spotting seals near the rocks at Takatu Point, hearing and seeing kiwi during the evenings, and enjoying the spectacular sunrises witnessed by Camp 2. The camps were a fantastic opportunity for students to challenge themselves, strengthen friendships and gain valuable outdoor experience.

## 3GEO Muriwai Beach Research Trip

### Researching Mysterious Muriwai!

On Friday 22<sup>nd</sup> May, our Year 13 Geography class travelled out to Muriwai Beach and Maukatia Bay as part of our internal assessment (Conduct Geographic Research with Consultation). This was a great opportunity for our class as we needed to conduct real world research, and collect data for our assessment, such as longshore drift, slope profile (angle of dune), the height of the dunes, etc. We were able to gather contrasting data across the two sites, because Muriwai beach is known for its long coastline, calmer waves and many dunes, whereas in Maukatia Bay is completely different, being sheltered by tall cliffs, and experiencing rougher waves in a smaller area. It was a very productive day spent gathering the data needed to back up our assessment. ### Free period products are available at Lynfield College.

The Ikura (Manaakitia te whare tangata) scheme is a Ministry of Education initiative providing free period products in New Zealand schools. At Lynfield College students can access regular pads, super pads, overnight pads, tampons and liners. Most products are unbranded.

Find these items throughout the school in bathrooms. A take home supply is available with paper bags from within Student Services, the Health centre bathrooms and the Deans offices.

Students are encouraged to take enough to cover a full cycle, including for use over weekends and holidays.

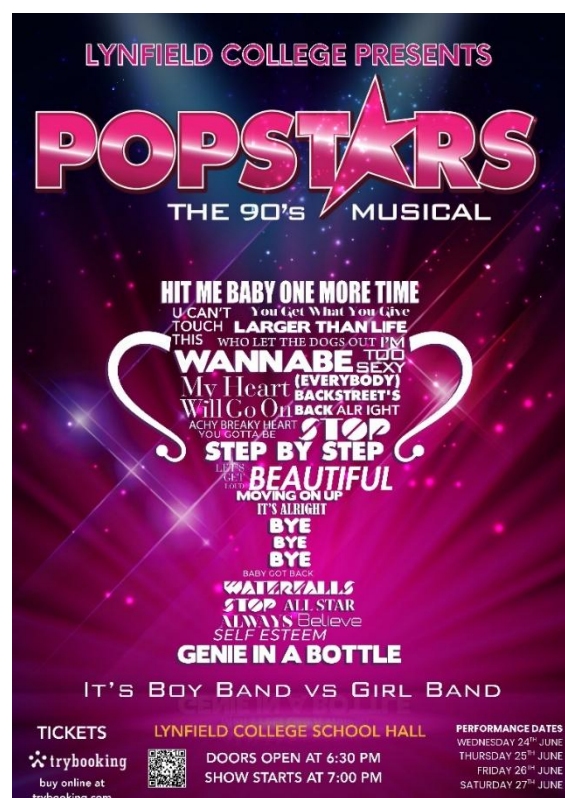
## Lynfield College Production - Popstars
